WHILE ON A VISIT WOMAN DIES—GASTON RESIDENT

Mrs. Ann M. Griebeler Passes at Daughter's Home in Hillsboro, Aged 73

Mrs. Ann M. Griebeler a resident of Gaston since 1884, died at Hillsboro Tuesday morning, while on a visit to her daughter, Mrs. F. Everest. Death was the result of heart disease.

Her son, L. O. Griebeler, a lumber dealer of Gaston, was married last week to Miss Laura Davidson, of Forest Grove.

She was born in England in 1841, and came to America with her parents when she was three years old, and lived in New York until 1854, when she moved with her parents to Wisconsin. There she married Edward M. Griebeler in 1872. They moved to Iowa and lived there until 1884, when they came to Gaston.

She united with the Baptist denomination at the age of 18. The husband and four children survive: Mrs. Florence A. Everest, Hillsboro, Mrs. Sopronia Child, Boring, Or., Mrs. Maud Storey and L. O. Griebeler Gaston, the following brothers and sisters, Mrs. Susan Pye, John R. and W. H. Butler, Wisconsin, Mrs. Mary Best, Sebastopol, Cal., J. T. Butler, Forest Grove, and thirteen grandchildren. Funeral Thursday at the Congregational Church, Gaston, Rev. B. Clarence Cook, pastor of the Hillsboro Baptist Church officiating.

She was a consistent Christian, kindly and charitable.
