Local Musician Gets Old Violin—

Charles Lovell Walker, the musician, is happy this week. Well, he is always that way, but he is happy plus now—and the cause of this abundant optimism is a rare old violin which came into the possession of the aforesaid Charles the first of the week. The instrument was made in 1814 by John Baptist Schweitzer, at Pesh, Hungary, and it bears a label to this effect, as well as a couple of other label repairs that were made at Dresden, Germany, in 1873 by Wilhelm Fredel, and another label of repair made in London in 1892 by Jos. A. Channot. Charles will have to give several extra lessons to pay for the violin, as it is said he paid \$100 for the instrument. But then he wouldn't take twice as much.

Bryant Will Pitch at U. of O.—

Death was the result of Tuberculosis. She was born in Ohio and her father moved here three years ago. Her mother died twelve years ago.

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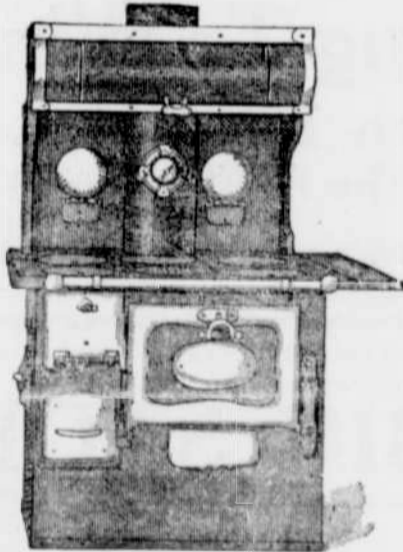
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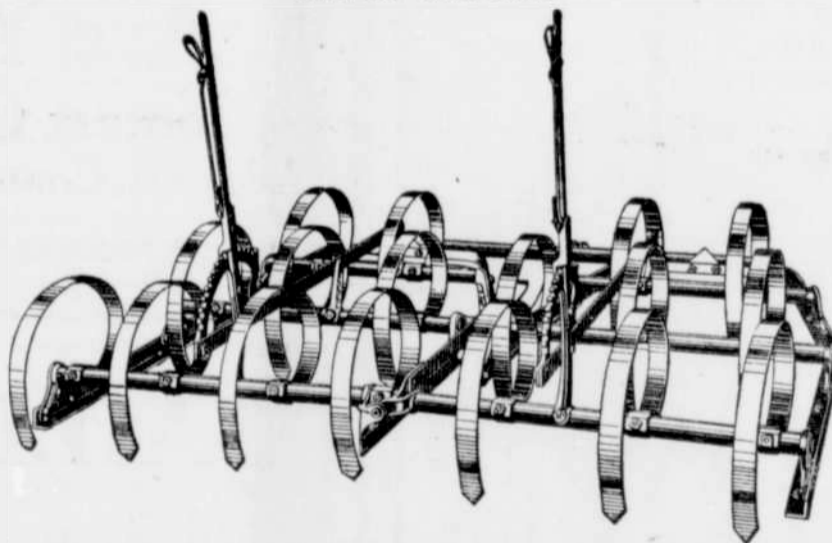


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
