Governor West has advised the mayor and city council of Sherwood not to renew the saloon license of Fred and Frank Colfelt.

"I have been advised that Fred Colfelt has recently been convicted under seven different indictments for the illegal sale of liquor," says the governor in a letter to the Sherwood officials, "and is now on parole on five of said counts, and that Frank Colfelt was recently fined \$200 and given six months in jail for a similar offense and is now out on parole."

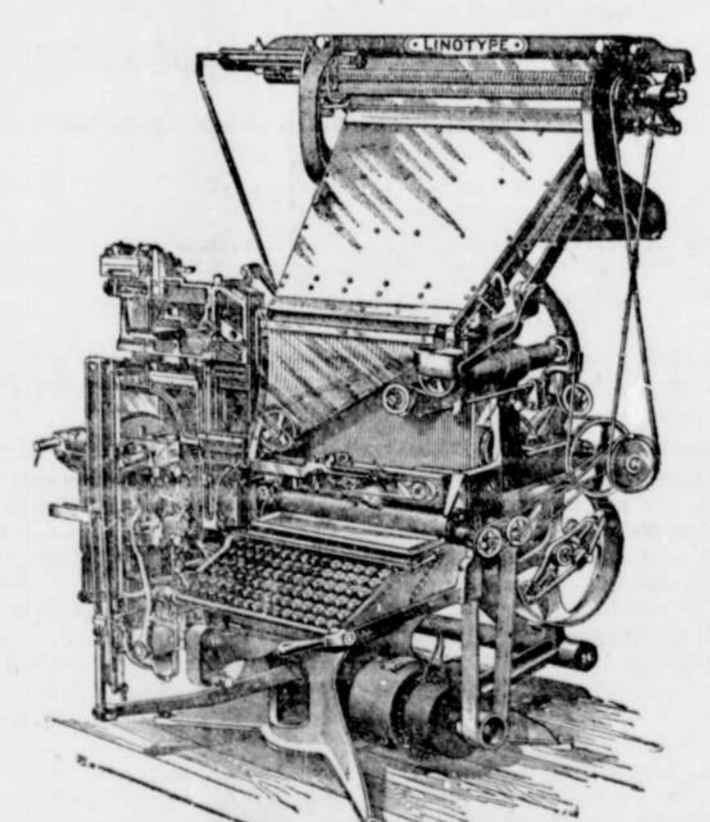
"Being charged with the enforcement of the laws of the state, I wish to call your attention and most emphatically protest against the issuance of licenses to these parties."
