Old Rod and Gun Club Elect Willis Goff President, to Meet With Other Clubs.

The Old Field and Stream Rod and Gun Club was reorganized at a meeting of sportsmen held in the K. of P. Club rooms Monday evening and the following were elected officers: Willis Goff, president; Earl Buxton, secretary and Harry Giltner, treasurer.

Willis Goff was appointed to represent the local club at the big convention of Oregon clubs in Portland next Monday. Fifty seven organizations over the state will be represented and the main topic of discussion will be along the line of protection of game and matters relative to the cutting down of the wholesale expense for game protection within the last few years.

President Goff of the local club thinks that the present expense is almost equal to robbery. "Compare the cost of \$137,800.00 of last year," under Mr. Finley he said, to \$44,000 in 1911 when Robert O. Stevenson was warden. Mr. Stevenson's office expense was less than \$75 and Finley's \$500."
