## POURED OIL ON FIRE—WILL DIE

### Mrs. Toney Camenzina of Beaverton Fatally Burned By Feeding Flames Oil.

A terrible accident, whereby the victim will probably lose her life, occurred at the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Camenzina one mile north of Beaverton, Tuesday morning. Mrs. Camenzina was attempting to start a fire in the kitchen stove by pouring oil on the wood.

There was a fire in the stove, but she was attempting to stimulate the blaze. As soon as the stream of oil from the can reached the fire there was an explosion, and the women was enveloped in flames. She ran out into the yard, screaming, and her husband, who was doing his morning's work at the barn, was attracted by her cries.

Quickly reaching her side, Mr. Camenzina seized his wife and rolled her on the ground in an effort to put out the fire. He then wrapped a blanket around her, and succeeded in extinguishing the blaze.

Dr. Ira Barrett of Beaverton and Dr. Bailey of Hillsboro were summoned, and they rendered all possible aid, but so much of the surface of the woman's body was burned over that there is practically no hope for her recovery. Mrs. Camenzina has a family of three children, and her terrible accident has cast a gloom over her neighborhood, where she has many friends.
