



Registration Time Is Here

The registration books are now open at the office of Miss Manche Langley and ALL voters MUST register before they will be allowed to vote at county and state elections.

All who register must give their residence (section or block), place of birth, age, and must have resided in the state at least six months at the date of election.

Foreigners MUST exhibit Final naturalization papers (first papers are not sufficient). A foreign-born wife is naturalized by her husband's papers or by having married an American citizen. A native-born woman loses right of suffrage by marrying a foreigner and must exhibit husband's naturalization papers.

Be prepared with this data when you go to register and REGISTER EARLY.
