Notice to Taxpayers

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, February 15, 1916, the tax rolls for the year 1915 will be opened for the collection of taxes. The first half of all taxes should be paid on or before April 5th following, and the second half on or before October 5th following. Interest shall be charged and collected at the rate of 1 per cent per month or a fraction of a month until paid. "Interest at said rate applies to the first half if not paid by April 5th, and to the second half if not paid by October 5th." All taxes remaining unpaid on October 5th, shall become delinquent, and on November 5th a penalty of 5 per cent will be charged and collected thereon in addition to the interest provided herein.
