Alfred Blank and Ada Westfall, both of Tualatin, secured a marriage license last week. Mr. Blank is a well-known resident of Tualatin, and recently purchased the Westfall store of that place. Miss Westfall is the daughter of Leon Westfall, old settler of that community.

A license was also issued to Wayne A. Van Kleck and Mabel R. Smith of near Scholls. Mr. Van Kleck is the son of J. J. Van Kleck, a well-known farmer of that section. Miss Smith is also a resident of the Scholls district.

But one suit has been filed in probate court the past week. This involves the appointment of Martina Huber as Administratrix of the estate of the late Jacob Huber. This estate aggregates in the neighborhood of \$7500.

Several suits were filed in circuit court the past week, all but one being mortgage foreclosures. Fred Bulling has filed suit on mortgage for \$600 dated Feb. 28, 1914.

Theresa Ruhe vs Chas. H. Osborn, satisfaction for mortgage, made in 1913, for the sum of \$800, with interest from that date.

Chas. L. Brown vs Geo. Little, foreclosure on mortgage of \$2400, made in 1815. Demands interest from date of mortgage.

M. H. Grosbeck vs Carl A. Kampa, foreclosure on mortgage dated in August, 1911. Suit for the recovery of the sum of \$1600, with interest from August, 1915.

Chas. R. Cox and Vina Cox vs H. W. Maryland, mortgage foreclosure, to recover \$3500, with interest for two years.

In the case of Melissa J. Steves vs Geo. Steves, the plaintiff is a woman 70 years of age, asking for a divorce from her husband, who, she alleges, has failed to support her and for the past year has treated her in a way other than human. Some days, it is alleged, that he would enter the house and sit for hours and sometimes the entire day without speaking. He continually asked that she accompany him to Idaho. The defendant is alleged to have spent the plaintiff's money to the extent of \$1700 to satisfy debts incurred by him prior to the marriage. She asks for her former name, Melissa J. Jackson.

Cases numbering three were tried and, in the case of Shaw vs Linderman, a verdict was returned for the plaintiff. Last fall Shaw and Linderman were mixed up in a row and in return for injuries received Linderman asked for \$2000 damages. The verdict allowed him \$5.00.

In the case of H. C. Allen vs John Koniger, the case was dismissed, on motion of the plaintiff, without costs.

Richard N. Gardner vs Grace W. Gardner; decree for plaintiff. Up to Saturday night, reports showed the registration of 3,252 republicans, 821 democrats and 344 of different minor parties.

Mrs. Charlton arrived in this city Monday morning to accompany Mr. and Mrs. Buxton to Newport but they were detained until Tuesday on account of a landslide on the Yaquina Bay line of the Southern Pacific.
