### Concerning Theodore E. Burton

Theodore E. Burton is Ohio's choice for president of the United States. Ohio is the battle ground for political supremacy and ever has been. It was the native state of Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Harrison, McKinley, and Taft.

"Mr. Burton is a staunch republican. He entered public life in 1888, when he was elected to Congress in a district near to Wm. McKinley's, and served shoulder to shoulder with that great advocate of protection in the framing of the McKinley Tariff Act of 1890. With the interruption of but two terms Mr. Burton served continuously in the house of representatives from that time until 1909 and then went to the senate to serve until 1915, declining to be a candidate for reelection. So strong was he in his own district that several times no candidate was nominated against him. During his service in the House he was for ten years chairman of the powerful committee on Rivers and Harbors. President Roosevelt appointed him chairman of the Inland Water Ways Commission and later he was chairman of the National Water Ways Commission.

Mr. Burton has extraordinary powers of physical endurance and enjoys the splendid vigor of health, which comes from temperate habits and a clean life.

First of all he has been loyal to republican principles. Next, he has dared to challenge powerful influences even in his own party, if they stood in the way of rational progress toward wider opportunities for all the people, or a sane conservatism where the honest business interests of the country were imperiled; and he has dared to oppose selfish politicians in both parties when they planned unconscionable raids upon the public treasury. The last conspicuous act of Mr. Burton in the U. S. senate will long be remembered as an instance of courageous statesmanship, when he led the filibusters that saved many millions of dollars of wasteful expenditure in the appropriation bill
