Circuit Court

Ernest E. Lang vs. Eva M. Purtell. Foreclosure on mortgage upon certain real property in the county of Multnomah.

In the case of Adah S. Moore vs. Edward L. Moore for divorce is found a variety of allegations. Plaintiff asks divorce on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment and non-support. Plaintiff also asks \$20 per month alimony and one-third of all the real property.

Probate Court

In the guardianship of John Liesman, et al., petition has been filed for the appointment of H. Liesman as guardian of the four Liesman children.

Petition has been filed for the appointment of A. H. Birrell as guardian of Andrea Christina Christensen, who is declared to be an incompetent. She is aged 48 years and relatives are petitioning for the appointment.

Miscellaneous

Fred Townsend of the Betheny country was last week landed in the county bastille by the sheriff, charged with threatening to take the lives of his children. This is the second time within a year that Townsend has been behind the bars. The first time was last summer, when he was arrested on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, after he had slashed Parley Howell of Beaverton with a razor during an altercation at the dinner table. After a trial, which resulted in conviction, he was paroled, subject to good behavior.

The delegates from the different Commercial organizations of the county met in Hillsboro Monday afternoon and ratified the constitution presented by the constitution committee. The organization is now complete.

TO VOTERS

The present district attorney is flooding the county with letters telling of his record and asserting that I have had assistance in some of the important cases I have tried. He states that every damage and every equity case tried has been won for the county; that no money has been paid for outside assistance and that the costs and fines collected approximately pay the entire expense of the criminal courts. Note that not a single figure is published. Voters are entitled to figures, that they may judge for themselves. In seven and one-half years he has tried three damage and four equity cases; has had an assistant all the time, except the last four cases, paid by the taxpayers; has tried five cases in the Supreme Court, won three and lost two.

The year 1915 was an average year and the fines and costs collected amount to \$2,956.35 and the entire expense of operating the criminal courts amounted to \$13,520.40. These are the figures, taken from the records, after deducting the cost of civil cases. The figures here given are for criminal matters alone.

I have had assistance in a few cases and have won many, while he has been assisted by his brother, an able attorney, in nearly all of his cases, civil and criminal. Do you recall more than half a dozen cases during the past eight years that he has tried alone?

If the office has been so ably and economically conducted, why the necessity for these misleading statements? He made the statement last Saturday at a meeting that the taxpayers were not required to pay over \$500 per year, while the figures show that the entire expense, after deducting fines and costs collected for the year 1915, was over \$10,000.

I have refrained from attacking the professional and social standing of my opponent, as I believe

in a fair, gentlemanly appeal to the voters. I am a candidate for the office of district attorney and will appreciate your support.
