Murdered Driver's Body Discovered

By telephone with Beaverton, the Express learns that the body of a man resembling Fred Ristman, who is believed to have hauled in his jitney to the Gore ranch the man who murdered Mrs. Helen Jennings on the night of May 15th, was found in a patch of timber three miles south of Tualatin at an early hour this morning by officers from this and Multnomah counties. The skull on the back of the head was crushed in, as from a blow from behind. The face is so badly decomposed as to be unrecognizable, but the clothing is very similar to that worn by Ristman when he left Portland for his fatal ride.

Another Veteran Called

Taps sounded for another veteran of the Civil war at 6:30 last evening, when James R. Williams, a highly-respected resident of this city passed away of heart trouble, after a lingering illness.

Deceased was born at Ottumwa, Iowa, in 1846 and served in the union army eighteen months, a member of the Twenty-fourth Iowa Infantry. He was united in marriage with Miss Louisa J. Mackey in Iowa in 1875 and, with his wife and children, came to Forest Grove seven years ago. He has, during his brief residence in this city, earned by his industry and courtesy, a large circle of friends, who will join with the sorrowing relatives in mourning for his death.

Mr. Williams has been ailing for about a year and had been bed-ridden for eight months.

Deceased is survived by a widow and seven children—Harry and Hardy Williams of Cripple Creek, Colo., Fred Williams of Peonia, Colo., James Williams, Mrs. Alta Goley, Mrs. Easter Richardson and Miss Ethel Williams of this city.

Funeral services will be held at the Buxton chapel at 2:30 tomorrow (Friday) afternoon, Rev. R. E. Dunlap officiating. The funeral will be under the auspices of the G. A. R. and W. R. C., deceased having been a member of the local post. Interment will be in Forest View cemetery.
