"Holding that the local ordinance closing theatres on Sunday is in violation of section 2135, known as the Sunday-closing law, Judge H. H. Belt, of the Circuit W. H. Greer, who says he heard a Court today lifted the Sunday lid from the moving-picture business.

"The Dallas city charter gives the city the right to regulate theatres and the ordinance in question was passed by the Council supposedly in pursuance with the charter provision. O. C. Smith was arrested for opening his theatre on Sunday night.
