THE PUBLIC PULSE

Explaining the Recall

Hillsboro, Ore., Oct. 22.
The recall movement against D. B. Reasoner, County Judge of Washington County, has not been fairly reported in the Hillsboro papers, which are in sympathy with Mr. Reasoner; nor in the dispatches which have been sent to the Portland papers.

This movement is a revolt of the farmer folk of Washington county at the futility of their efforts to get good roads built with the taxes which they have been voluntarily levying upon themselves for years. The experience of the people of Dist. 25, who inaugurated this movement, has been the general experience of the people of the whole county and the rural districts stand almost solidly behind it.

The voters of Dist. 25 protested against the appointment of a man as supervisor, whom past experience had taught them they did not want, and nearly forty men presented to the county court a petition signed by over 80 per cent of the voters of the district asking for the appointment of another man. Judge Reasoner accorded them neither consideration nor courtesy. He said that he was not there to be dictated to; that their petition was not worth the paper it was written on; that he would appoint no man the people petitioned for; that he was doing that and it was none of their business; that they had nothing to say about it.

There were about 20 per cent more names than were necessary on the recall petition when handed to the county clerk, and they were gathered by the volunteer efforts of farmers and their wives at their own expense and personal sacrifice. There is no politics behind this recall; no money; no influence, except a deep and abiding resentment of the people of this county against the gross mismanagement of their affairs and a grim determination to find some way to better conditions.
