

The resolutions committee composed of H. E. Inlow of this city and Messrs. Bradford and Winger, brought in resolutions of thanks to Superintendent Barnes, the instructors, and the teachers of Hillsboro for their kindness and hospitality; recommended that the state association formulate a code of ethics, endorsed the plan to provide a teachers' retirement fund, went on record for a Normal school at Pendleton and endorsed the movement for more simplified spelling.
