Formal Flag Raising at High School

Commencing Monday last, the students of the Forest Grove High school will "stand colors" each morning. The Boy Scouts took charge of the flag and raised it in regulation manner. Hereafter, a properly instructed squad of students will participate each morning and evening at raising and lowering of the colors. Assistant Scout Masters Buxton and Taylor will instruct pupils of the Lincoln and Central schools and they, also, will have formal flag-raising and lowering.

To the Public

Forest Grove is seriously threatened with an epidemic of mumps, a disease which we all know is quite contagious.

While ordinarily the results are not serious, yet not infrequently serious complications arise that may even prove fatal or leave the person permanently disabled. The only protection for our schools is a quarantine of those who have it and of those who have been exposed to it. But quarantine measures are efficient only when they are strictly carried out. Aside from the many pupils who have not had the disease, more than half the teachers also have not had it, so that if there should be a widespread epidemic they would probably come down with it, which would necessitate closing the schools.

We would therefore ask the hearty co-operation of all concerned in order that the quarantine may be made as efficient as possible so as to limit the number of cases, and that every suspicious case may be reported either to the family physician or to the city health officer.

Notice to Taxpayers

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, February 19, 1917, the tax rolls for the year 1916 will be opened for the collection of taxes. The first half of all taxes shall be paid on or before April 5th, following, and the second half on or before October 5th, following. Interest shall be charged and collected at the rate of 1 per cent per month, or a fraction of a month, until paid. "Interest at said rate applies to the first half if not paid by April 5th, and to the second half if not paid by October 5th." All taxes remaining unpaid on October 5th shall become delinquent and on November 5th a penalty of 5 per cent will be charged and collected thereon, in addition to the interest provided herein. Any day after the expiration of six months after the taxes charged against real property are delinquent, the Sheriff shall have the right, and it shall be his duty, upon demand, to make out and issue certificates of delinquency against such property. Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest at the rate of 15 per cent. On or as soon as practicable after October 5th, the tax collector shall proceed to collect all taxes levied against personal property, and which shall have been unpaid, and shall levy upon sufficient goods and chattels of delinquent taxpayers and sell same to satisfy said tax, or said Sheriff shall charge said personal property tax against real property and said tax shall become a lien upon said real property, and shall be enforced in the same manner as other real estate tax liens.
