CATHOLIC SERVICES

For Forest Grove and Cornelius for Holy Week, Easter and First Communion

Commencing with Palm Sunday, April 1st, the Catholic church inaugurates the ceremonies of Holy Week, which ends with the Lenten season on Easter Sunday. Mass during Holy Week will be in Forest Grove as follows: Thursday, Friday and Saturday at 7 a. m. Easter Sunday there will be two High Masses, with specially prepared music. The first one at Cornelius at 8 and the second at Forest Grove at 10:30. The beautiful decorations of flowers, which have been absent during Lent in honor of our Savior's passion and death, will again adorn the altars, the bright vest-

ments will again be worn and the music will once more be of the bright and cheerful kind. Sermons will be preached at both Masses. Everyone is invited to join the services, both during the week and on Easter. On the Sunday following, April 15th, a large class of children will make their First Holy Communion in Forest Grove at a 9:00 o'clock Mass. On that morning there will be a low Mass at Cornelius at 7:00 o'clock. Again everyone is invited.

Billy Sunday Once More

At the Congregational church, Mr. Fenenga will continue last Sunday's talk on Billy Sunday and the Religious Education Association. That thirty times as many people as attended the National Convention of Religious Education attended Billy Sunday's meeting each day is at least significant.

At the evening service an illustrated address on early Christian life, statuary and painting will be given. The slides are direct photographs taken in Rome, the Holy Land and in the museums of Europe and America.
