ARE YOU INTERESTED?

Messrs. H. W. Strong and S. C. Bratton, connected with the Portland Gas & Coke company, were in the city last week, trying to get a line on public sentiment regarding a franchise that would permit their company to sell gas in this city.

They have franchises to enter Beaverton, Hillsboro and Cornelius and have been invited into Orenco, this county, and are in Oregon City and Milwaukie, in Clackamas county and in practically every part of Multnomah county. They ask nothing but permission to lay and maintain their pipes in the streets, alleys and parkings of the city, with the right to sell gas at Portland prices

(\$1.00 per 1,000 feet). They ask no guarantee of patronage, nor will they pay anything (except taxes) for the franchise. They agree to leave the streets and pavements in as good condition as they find them and will put up a bond for that purpose. The franchise must be for 25 years, but need not be exclusive.

The company paid Clackamas county almost \$2,000 in taxes last year.

The city council has turned down the application, with the suggestion that if the company wants a franchise, it can appeal to the people through a vote at a regular or special election. The gentlemen who were here last week stated that, while they would like to have public sentiment on the question, they didn't want to put the city to the expense of an election, nor did they care to be put in the position of trying to come where they were not wanted. They may, they say, in a few days again ask the council for a franchise, and it might not be a bad idea for Express readers to give the matter some thought and make a recommendation to their favorite councilman. The Express believes the councilmen will be please to get expressions from their constituents.

So the People May Understand

There have been so many unfounded rumors concerning the aims of the Washington County Good Roads Association that the officers have asked the Express to publish the following resolutions, adopted at a mass meeting held in Orenco on March 27th, 1917:

"WHEREAS, The roads of Washington County should be improved and put into the best possible shape for travel the year round; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That we, the following citizens of Washington County, form ourselves into a permanent organization, to be known as the Washington County Good Roads Association, and that the purpose of this organization shall be to work for good roads, and that as members of this Association we use our influence to have our separate road districts vote a special levy for road improvement whenever it is necessary; and be it further

"Resolved, That the officers of this Association shall consist of a President, Secretary-Treasurer, and an Executive Committee of one person from each road district. That meeting shall be held at such places and times as the Executive Committee shall deem necessary.

"Whereas, The road leading from the City of Hillsboro to the City of Portland, known as the Cornell Road, has a gap of about four miles that needs to be rocked, and should also be straightened in places, thus shortening the distance; and as this is one of the principal thoroughfares leading from the City of Portland to Valley Points, and has not in the past received just aid from the County; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That this association

work to secure the rocking of this gap so that the road will be serviceable for travel the entire period of the year.

"Whereas, There is a \$6,000,000 bond issue to be voted on June 4th for the purpose of building State Highways, and, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That this meeting endorse the proposed Bond Issue and pledge its members to work and vote for same.

"Whereas, There is a State-wide interest on the subject of Good Roads at this time; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the executive committee of this association is hereby authorized to call a mass meeting to be held Saturday, May 26th at Orenco, Oregon, to be known as "Good Roads Day," and secure speakers to discuss the \$6,000,000 bond issue to be voted on June 4th, 1917, and other matters of interest to Good Roads.

"Whereas, The people living south of Orenco have no way of entering the town except by coming up over a hill which is very steep and up which it is hard work for a team to pull an empty rig; and as they have to make a wide detour to even get to the hill; and

"Whereas, The people living along the route of the proposed road, which will connect the Base Line Road with the Reedville Road due south from Orenco, have nearly unanimously signed a petition to the Honorable County Court to have said road opened, and have also donated labor and right-of-ways for same; and the citizens of Orenco have also donated labor and cash to help open up the road and grade said hill and have been assured of cheap rock for surfacing said hill; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That this Association pledge its moral support to the people of that neighborhood in their efforts to secure the said road."

The officers of the association are M. McDonald, Orenco, president; H. V. Meade, Orenco, secretary-treasurer, and Andrew Egigiman (Beaverton Route 2), Rudolph Pubols (Hillsboro Route 1), John Traschel (Beaverton Route 2), J. C. Bechen (Hillsboro Route 1), Perry Gardner (Beaverton Route 4), J. C. Wilson (Orenco), executive committee.

Remember the all-day meeting and dinner at Orenco on Saturday, May 26, to further discuss better roads.
