Road Bond Bill Pulls Through

The measure to bond the state for \$6,000,000 carried in the state at last Monday's election by about 17,000, Portland's heavy vote in the affirmative having pulled the measure through. The proposition to permit ports to bond to facilitate water transportation also carried. The vote of Forest Grove was as follows:
