**An Important Sale**

On June 27th J. W. Hughes, premier livestock auctioneer of Oregon, sold for Congressman C. N. McArthur at Rickreall thirty-one head of Jersey cattle for the sum of \$7,735.00. The highest-priced cow sold to a breeder of Silverton for \$820 and D. G. Lilly of this city paid \$425 for a four-months-old calf. J. J. Van Kleek of Kinton paid \$640 for two cows and C. S. Bair of Portland paid \$560 for a cow. Ten bull calves averaged \$157.50.

**New Dog Law in Effect**

By the provisions of a law which went into effect Sunday, every owner of a male dog or spayed female dog over six months of age is liable for a tax of \$1.50 per year and for unspayed females \$3.00 per year. The law applies to all of the state west of the Cascade range, except the city of Portland and Josephine, Jackson, Coos, Curry, Lincoln, Tillamook, Clatsop and Columbia counties. It is the duty of the constable of the precinct to make the collections and give those paying a receipt and identification tag for their dogs. Where owners refuse to pay, they are liable to a fine of \$50 and imprisonment for a term of 25 days in the county jail, or both such fine and imprisonment, and their unlicensed dogs shall be destroyed by the constable.

The funds raised by this tax go into a fund to reimburse people who have sheep, goats, swine or fowls killed by dogs. People whose animals have been killed must file with the county clerk within ten days from the killing a statement of the facts, setting forth the amount of damage sus-

tained. At its first regular meeting following, the county court shall consider the facts in the case. No person can collect damages where animals or fowls have been killed by their own dogs.
