New Business Firm For Forest Grove

E. D. Stout, late of Portland, representing the Stout Auto company, has taken a year's lease on the entire ground floor and basement of the K. of P. block, on Pacific avenue, and the building is being remodeled for an auto assembling plant, salesroom and garage. The work of remodeling the building is now in progress. The company has the Washington county agency for Ford cars and will specialize in these cars, which they will receive knocked down, to be assembled in this city, but some of the other tried and tested makes of cars will also be handled.

Mr. Stout has been with the Ford company at Portland for the last five years and knows the motor business from all angles. Repairs and accessories for most of the standard cars will be carried in stock and vulcanizing will be made a feature of the repair shop. It is expected that the company will employ at least a half-dozen men to start with, more later if the patronage justifies it.

Mr. Stout is a married man and Mrs. Stout will come to this city as soon as she completes her vacation visit to the beach.

Thirteen Fined for Speeding

The county court having decided to abolish speeding on the highways of Washington county, thirteen auto drivers were arrested Saturday and Sunday for exceeding the 25-mile speed limit set by a state law. One-Third Drafted Men Wanted by Sept. 1

Washington, Aug. 8.—The first one-third of the quota of 687,000 men drafted for army service under the selection bill will be called to the colors Sept. 1 and sent to training camps between Sept. 1 and 5. This information has been communicated to the governors of all states by Provost Marshal General Crowder.

Food Bills Have Passed Both Houses

Washington, Aug. 8.—The food control bill passed through the last stage of legislative enactment at 4 o'clock this afternoon, when it was finally adopted by the senate in form previously approved by the house. The vote in the senate was 66 to 7. President Wilson's signature will make the bill a law.

He has a rich baritone voice and never fails to charm his hearers with his solos. This will probably be his last meeting for some time, as he is a member of the 14th ambulance corps and will soon leave for service in France.

The young evangelists expressed themselves delighted with Forest Grove. Mr. Kelles said, when interviewed regarding his plans for the meeting, that he had seldom been in a town of the size of Forest Grove where the streets and homes present such a clean, high-class appearance. "We are going to enjoy our stay here and we trust it will result in lasting good for the whole community."

The services begin every evening at eight o'clock.

A delegation of Beaverton residents headed by M. P.
