

New Extension Director **Experienced Farmer**

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Sept. 3.-O. D. Center, the new extension director at the pers with non-poisonous ink. Oregon Agricultural College, arived at Corvallis last Saturday and has already taken up the work of getting some of the best farming and homemaking information available at the College of J. W.
