## WATCH YOUR CROPS

Always Keep a Sharp Lookout for Many Insect Pests.

Farmers Should Provide Themselves With Poisons and Then Keep Vigil for First Outbreak of Enemies of Farm Crops.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Much of the destruction to crops by insect pests is due to the failure of farmers and fruit growers to detect an outbreak at its beginning, and to delay in getting the necessary combative material. Farmers who provide themselves with insect poisons and then keep a vigil for the first outbreaks of crop enemies will bring through the largest yields.

That a great part of the annual loss to grain crops due to insect injuries can be avoided by vigilance and vigorous action on the part of growers is not sufficiently realized. Frequently insect outbreaks originate within a limited area, and when this is the case it is often quite possible to stamp them out before any great damage has been done. If the outbreak is general, then community action is essential to prevent the infestation from becoming widespread.

Watch your crops constantly. Make a daily survey of the fields during the most active growing season, if possible.

If an outbreak of any insect foe is discovered, apply promptly the remedies which are recommended in publications of state experiment stations and of the United States department of agriculture.

If in doubt as to the identity of a pest, send specimens promptly in a tight tin box to your county agricultural agent, state experiment station or nearest federal entomological field station, accompanied by a request for information regarding it.

Keep on hand at least a small supply of the standard insecticide preparations, such as paris green, lime, and arsenate of lead.

Report serious outbreaks of insects to the state or national authorities mentioned above. Federal entomological field stations charged with the investigation of cereal and forage insects are located at the following places:

## NO SEED FOR DISTRIBUTION

Department of Agriculture Will Assist in Locating Stocks Where There is Shortage.

No seed for free distribution nor for sale is at the disposal of the United States department of agriculture. The department, however, through its committee of seed stocks, is receiving daily telegraphic and other reports as to available supplies of seeds of crops for late planting, and will assist in locating seed stocks for localities where shortages exist. The committee is cooperating with state, local and commercial agencies in an effort to secure better distribution of seed and to encourage plantings of all important crops.

## HIGH CHECKING NOT FAVORED

People Beginning to Realize Horse Is More Beautiful in Natural State—Hard on Colts.

In recent years there has been a falling off in the habit of using the check-rein on horses, at least to extremes. People with good taste have come to realize that a horse is more beautiful in its natural state and that high checking will ruin any animal. There are some principles governing the use of the check-rein which everybody who is humane agrees to.

Draft horses should have the free use of their heads, unhindered. Driving horses should only be checked when necessary for their proper control. Check-reins cause more stiff shoulders and weak knees than all other causes combined.

Colts should not be made to endure the biting bridle over fifteen minutes at a time. To keep it on half a day, as some do, is to inflict one of the worst punishments possible. Some colts are permanently injured by it.



## Calf Feeding Points

1. Let calf have colostrum or first milk; take from mother not later than fifth day.
2. Feed whole milk for two weeks; gradually change to skim milk, using ten days in making the change.
3. Start with eight to ten pounds and gradually increase to twelve to sixteen pounds at six months.
4. Begin feeding ground corn and oats at two weeks of age.
5. Provide good alfalfa or clover hay at all times, good pasture when possible.

## HANDY HANGER FOR HARNESS

Arrangement Shown in Illustration Will Keep Horse's Outfit Off of Floor and Clean.

This is a new idea of a harness hanger. Many a farmer has hung up his harness after a hard day's work and come back to the barn the next morning to find it on the ground and



tramped under the feet of the horses. It is hard on the harness and bad for the animals that have to wear it to have it encrusted with dirt. With this handy hanger the harness is hung up in the manner best calculated to keep it straight, and with a few seconds more of work a guard is snapped over the ends and the harness will be there until it is taken down again.

Especially So Where Grass is Sparse and Unthrifty—Profitable to Use the Mower.

In permanent pasture, especially where the grass is sparse and unthrifty, weeds become a menace. If neglected as the seasons go by these weeds will spread over the entire pasture, in time smothering or crowding out the valuable grass. Sheep will keep most of these weeds in check, but where no sheep are kept headway is gained rapidly.

It is easiest to eradicate these weeds when they first make their appearance and are few and scattered. The work can be accomplished with the hoe and scythe. If, however, they have gained too great a headway the mower must be employed. It is both practical and profitable, anyway, to run over the pasture fields with the mower so as not to leave any weeds go to seed.

## LEGUMES CAUSED TO THRIVE

When Necessary Organisms Are Not Present, Scatter Soil From Some Inoculated Field.

Some legumes require inoculation. That is, the soil is not always supplied with the organisms that cause legumes to thrive and use free nitrogen. When these organisms are not present it is necessary to introduce them by scattering the soil from an inoculated field over the ground to be planted in the particular legume.

## WEEDS REQUIRE MUCH WATER

Plain to Be Seen That Cutting Down Noxious Plants is Moisture Saved for Crops.


A large weed may use as much as a barrel of water. A plant weighing one pound when dried has used up 700 to 800 pounds of water in making its growth, 70 to 80 gallons, making nearly two barrels. From this it is plain that cutting down weeds is a very good way of saving moisture for the crop.—North Dakota Experiment Station.

Provide for Alfalfa Seed.

About one-half the alfalfa seed was imported last year as in the three years preceding, and very much less of other seeds was imported. Farmers will do well to make early provision for their 1917 seeding of all crops.

Prime Factor of Melon.

The quality of a melon is the primary factor which determines its grade, though size and condition are also to be considered.


