Elmer Bennett, former chief of police, but now employed on a farm near Gaston, was trading with local merchants Saturday.

The announcement comes from Washington that the government will soon pay to Washington county, the sum of \$15,371 60, the taxes, penalties and interest on the S. P. lands which have been declared reverted back to the Federal government. Tax Commissioner Galloway has furnished the government with the statement, and it has been accepted by the head of the bureau handling the grant lands. This pays the tax up to 1916, and since that date there is no taxation against the property on the rolls.

Sigurd Seim, of above Dille, has sued Ernest Herr, Sr., for \$17,200, alleging that in 1915 he bought a horse, or mare, at a public sale from Herr; that the animal was guaranteed to be safe for ladies to drive. He says that later he attempted to drive to Dille when the mare kicked him out of the buggy and broke his leg. He says he paid out over \$500 for a surgeon and medical services and lost over \$2,000 in wages. He asks for damages also, running the amount wanted up to the above sum.—Hillsboro Argus.

Highway Route Not Yet Decided

The controversy over the routing of the west side highway between Portland and Hillsboro will probably be settled in favor of Orenco at the next meeting of the state highway commission, says Sunday's Oregon Journal. The Washington county court has asked for an early decision in order that the county budget for next year may provide funds for preparing the grade on whatever route is chosen.

Two routes are proposed, one by way of Bertha, Beaverton and Reedville, and the other by Orenco, leaving Beaverton a short distance to one side.

It is understood that Chairman Benson and Commissioner Adams of the state highway commission have practically decided that the Orenco route should be adopted. Commissioner Thompson has not yet expressed his judgment.

While the county court of Washington preferred to pass the question up to the highway commission, it is known that Judge Reasoner is inclined to the Beaverton-Reedville road.

The controlling factor in the minds of the highway commissioners in favor of the Orenco route is the fact that it is removed from the railroad and connects with two roads leading out of Portland, the Canyon and Cornell.
