Notice is hereby given that a meeting of the resident tax payers of Road Districts Nos. 20, 24, 29, 56 and 58, Washington County, Oregon, is hereby called, and will be held at the following places in said Road Districts in Washington County, Oregon, on the 24th day of November, 1917, to-wit:

The twelfth Annual Western Oregon Older Boys' Conference is scheduled for Eugene on November 30th, December 1st and 2nd, under the direction of the Interstate Executive Committee Young Men's Christian Association of Oregon and Idaho.

The Conference is being put on a War-basis, taking as its theme, "The Challenge of War." Other state organizations have felt the great need of such a conference and are showing their influence most heartily in the promotion plans. The Boys' Working Reserve, U. S.
