Judge W. H. Hollis, Chairman of the local branch, reports that the recent Red Cross drive, which was prosecuted so vigorously, secured a total subscription of \$9,007.35, of which amount \$8,561.93 has been collected; \$8,500.00 has been remitted to the War Relief Fund. The total expense incurred in handling this amount was \$54.80, for mailing statements, stationery, etc., leaving a balance in the bank on December 11th, of \$7.13. The subscriptions numbered 1234 in all, on which \$445.00 remains unpaid, and the officers of the local branch, W. H. Hollis, chairman; R.


E. Dunlap, secretary, and M. R. John-son, treasurer, have labored tirelessly in making these collections and remittances.

Owing to the Forest Grove branch now being an independent branch, 25 per cent of all money remitted to the War Relief Fund is returned for use in prosecuting the work here. This will be used largely for the purchase of materials for the War Relief committee. To Mrs. J. F. Sanders for a very for knitted garments, bandages, pajamas, surgeons' gowns, etc. Next week we will publish a complete and itemized list of all that has been shipped from the Forest Grove branch. A Christmas package has been sent from this branch to every man in the service from this town and community, there being 125 in all. These packages weighed 4 pounds each and contained 1 lb, of sweet chocolate, 1 lb, raisins, 1-2 lb. figs, 2 cakes toilet soap, 2 hand-kerchiefs, 2 packages of gum, 1 wash cloth, 1 package of envelopes and a writing tablet. The postage amounted to about \$40,00, and the packages cost a little more than a dollar each. Doubtless these reminders of the ones at home "who care" will be joyfully re-ceived at Yuletide, when the boys are thinking longingly of the home hearth.
