Patriotic Workers Will Organize

A committee of Hillsboro citizens, composed of Mayor John Wall, J. E. Reeves, S. C. Killen, M. Mahon and Chas. E. Wells, met with W. H. Hollis, L. M. Graham, B. J. Simpson, W. J. McCready and W. C. Benfer in this city last Thursday evening, by appointment, and the two committees talked over plans for a closer co operation in Red Cross and other drives, as well as plans promoting the patriotism of the the county. It was decided that a meeting should be held at Hillsboro tomorrow (Friday) afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with the five Forest Grove men mentioned as delegates from this city, to meet delegates from Hillsboro, Sherwood, Orenco, Beaverton, Banks, Cornelius, Cedar Mills, Gaston, North Plains, Tigardville and Tualatin.

At this meeting a permanent central committee, composed of one delegate from each of the districts named, will be chosen and other steps taken to build up a more efficient organization to back up Uncle Sam in his fight against Kaiserism.
