Order Spray Material Now

Insect pests and fungus diseases are always with us and must be combatted. Due to transportation difficulties and a possible shortage of spray material, growers are urged to consider their seasonal needs and order their insecticides and fungicides now. Both Prof. Lovett and Prof. Barss, O. A. C. specialists, think that growers had best order as early as possible. Lead arsenate has practically doubled in price, and in many cases it may be advisable to substitute arsenate of lime, (calcium arsenate). This material is satisfactory and safe when used properly. Representative samples of the material (one-half pound) should be sent to the chemist of the Oregon Experiment Station, Corvallis, for analysis and advice as to the dilution to use and the proper procedure when mixing.

1918 Election Calendar

(Paste this article in your scrap book)

Registration books now open, will remain open until April 16. All registered voters who have changed residence since last registration must re-register. New arrivals in state, who have completed first six months of residence, may register. Minors who have just attained majority may register. Minors who will attain majority between April 16 and May 16 may register between March 18 and April 16. After primaries, registration books will be re-opened for general election.

PRIMARIES

- April 12—Last day for filing nominating petitions for state offices and for filing portraits and arguments for and against candidates for state office.
- April 16—Registration books close for primaries.
- April 17—Last day for filing nominating petitions for county offices.
- May 8—Last day on which official pamphlet may be mailed to registered voters.
- May 16—Last day on which candidate may withdraw nominating petitions.
- May 16—Last day on which vacancies caused by death or removal may be filled by petition.
- May 17—Primary Nominating Election; polls open 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.
- May 27—Last day for filing report of campaign expenditures by individuals (not candidates) expending \$50.00 or more each.
- June 1—Last date for filing report of campaign expenditures, by candi-

dates, political agents and political committees; candidates limited to 15 per cent of first year's salary, minimum \$100.00.

June 12—Date on which district attorneys are required to institute prosecution for failure to file reports of campaign expenditures.

GENERAL ELECTION

- July 3—Last day for filing initiative petitions; signatures required, 22,533.
- July 13—Last day for filing arguments for initiative and referendum measures.
- July 23—Last day for filing arguments against initiative and referendum petitions.
- Sept. 10—Last day for filing nominating certificates by parties independent of those made at primaries.
- Sept. 25—Last day for filing independent nomination petitions by electors.
- Sept. 26—Last day for filing arguments for and against candidates.
- Oct. 5—Registration books close.
- Oct. 26—Last day for mailing official pamphlet to registered voters.
- Nov. 4—Last day for withdrawing nomination.
- Nov. 4—Last day for filing nominating petitions to fill vacancies on ballot caused by death or removal.
- Nov. 5—General Election—Polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.
- Nov. 15—Last day for filing statements of campaign expenditures by individuals and organizations other than candidates.
- Nov. 20—Last day for filing statements of campaign expenditures by candidates; candidates limited to 10 per cent of first year's salary.
- Dec. 5—Date of governor's proclamation declaring nominees elected and measures enacted.

OFFICIALS TO BE ELECTED

National—National Committeeman; United States Senator to complete unexpired term expiring March 3, 1919; United States Senator to serve six years beginning March 4, 1919; Representatives in Congress to serve two years beginning March 4, 1919.
 State—Governor; State Treasurer; one Justice of the Supreme Court; Attorney-General; Superintendent of Public Instruction; Labor Commissioner and Public Service Commissioner at Large.
 Water Divisions—One Superintendent for Each of Two Divisions, Eastern Oregon and Western Oregon.
 Circuit Court—Three judges Multnomah county, one Umatilla and Morrow, one Hood River and Wasco and one Baker.
 District Attorneys—36, one for each county.
 State Senators—15, two Marion county; one each from Linn, Lane, Jackson, Yamhill, Clackamas, Multnomah, Clatsop, Umatilla and Baker; one each from following joint districts: Lane and Linn; Benton and Polk; Clackamas, Multnomah and Columbia; Morrow, Umatilla and Union.
 State Representatives—60, from all districts.
 County Officers—These vary in the different counties.

Notice to Taxpayers

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, Feb. 18, 1918, the tax rolls for the year 1917, will be open for collection of taxes, and the first half of all taxes shall be paid on or before April 5 following, and the second half on or before October 5 following. Interest shall be charged and collected at the rate of one percent per month or fraction of a month in case of delinquency, until paid. Interest at said rate applies to the first half if not paid by April 5, and to the second half if not paid by October 5. All taxes remaining unpaid on October 5 shall be delinquent and on November 5, 1918, a penalty of 5 percent will be charged and collected thereon in addition to the interest herein provided.

Any day after the expiration of six months after the taxes charged against any real property are delinquent, the Sheriff shall have the right, and it shall be his duty upon demand, to make out and issue certificates of delinquency against such property. Said certificates to bear interest at the rate 12 percent. On or as soon as practicable after October 5, the tax collector shall proceed to collect all taxes levied against personal property, which shall have been unpaid and shall levy upon sufficient goods and chattels of delinquent tax payers and sell same to satisfy said tax, or said sheriff shall charge said personal tax against real property and said tax shall become a lien upon said real property, and shall be enforced in the same manner as other real estate tax liens.

In making request for statement of taxes, town lots should be designated by addition and lot and block number. Acreage should be designated by Section, Township and Range. Whenever possible descriptions should be copied from deed or contract. On paying second half of tax it will be necessary to return the original first-half tax receipt.

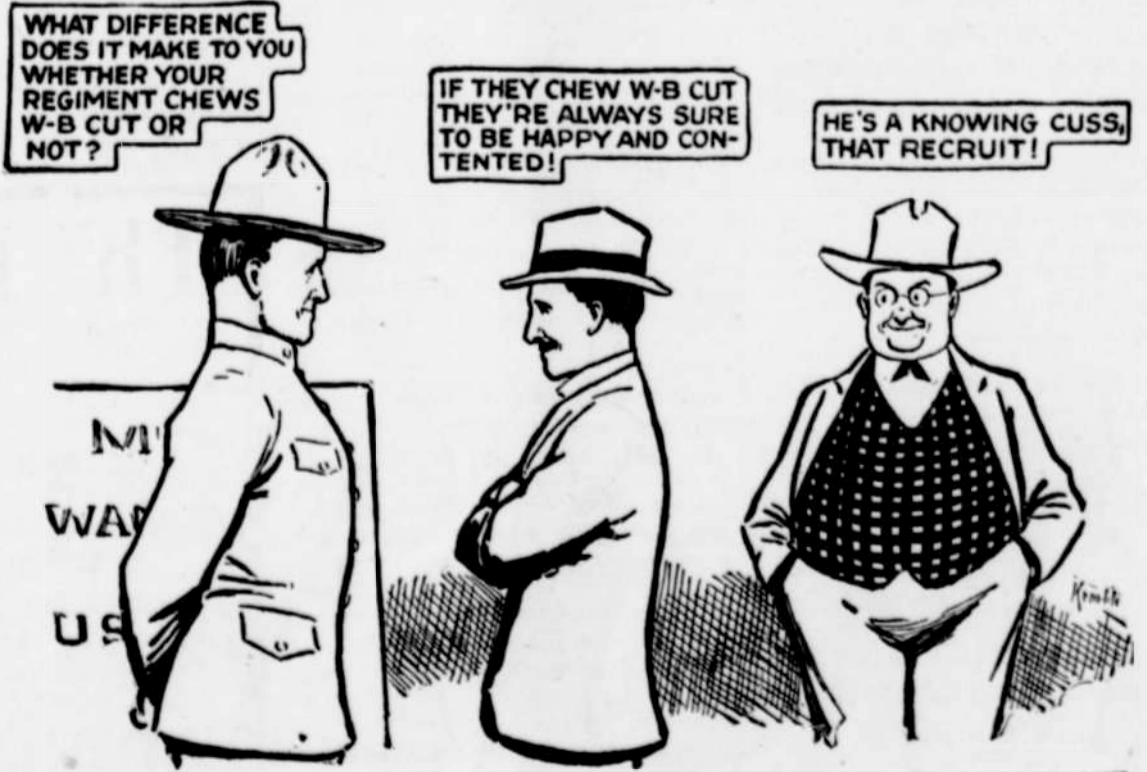
