Liberty Ginger Bread

The following recipe for ginger bread was furnished by Mrs. Humphreys, who makes excellent bread from it:

1 cup cooking molasses
½ cup brown sugar
1 cup sweet milk
1 cup oat flour
1 cup barley meal
1 cup white flour
2 tablespoons shortening
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon soda
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon ginger
1 teaspoon cinnamon

Bake 45 minutes in slow oven; quantities given make big 2-pound loaf.
