Pupils Deserve Honor Flag

The Forest Grove public schools have just completed a two weeks' drive for the sale of War Saving Stamps. Four squads of workers were chosen from the schools as follows: Two from the High School, one from Lincoln school and one from Central School, making a total of sixteen workers in the field. Every home in the city was canvassed with good results since almost all people visited bought stamps. The total sales of each squad were as follows: Lincoln School \$606.10, upper division of the High School \$480.85, lower division of the High School \$316.65, and Central School \$668.25. The group having the greatest number of sales to its credit was of Central School. Pupils of this group with the amount of sales to their credit was Donald Randall \$212.55, Elizabeth Todd \$308.00, Elizabeth Tucker \$110.00, and James Randall \$37.10. Pupils selling the greatest number of stamps, who will receive prizes are as follows: Irvin Thomas \$400.00, Elizabeth Todd \$308.00, and Martha Schuh \$278.65. The first prize will be a War Saving Stamp, the second twelve Thrift Stamps and the third eight Thrift Stamps. Lincoln School deserves additional credit for the sale of war stamps carried on before the drive was started, since the above rep-

resents only what was sold by that school during the two-weeks' canvass.
