Cut-Worm Control

Agricultural Agent Neal Jami-
son recommends this mixture for
poisoning cut-worms: 16 pounds
coarse bran, 1/2 lb. Paris green, 1/4
lb. salt, 1 qt. cheap syrup. Mix
as moist mash, not sloppy; scatter
in evening around plants. Very
poisonous to fowls and animals.
