**Washington County Cows Stand High**

The Washington County Cattle Testing Association has completed another month's work and the following records have been made as reported by Tester C. H. Bryant: Three hundred and twenty-nine cows were tested during the month and their average production was 706 lbs. of milk and 32.8 lbs. of fat. The average feed cost per cow was \$9.78; 66 cows of the number produced over 40 lbs. of fat during the month and 19 cows produced over 50 lbs. fat.

La Creole's Amy, the pure-bred eight-year old Jersey owned by J. J. Van Kleek & Son made the highest record of the association for the month, having produced 1335 lbs. of milk and 70.5 lbs. of fat. The highest grade cow is owned by Wm. Behrman. His cow "Fifteen," a four-year-old grade Jersey, producing 985 lbs. milk and 67 lbs. of fat. The highest average herds in the association are as follows: Geo. F. Biersdorf's herd of 11 cows averaged 756 lbs. milk and 43 lbs. of fat; Wm. Behrman's herd of 22 cows averaged 780 lbs. of milk and 42.5 lbs. of fat; Robb Bros' herd of 6 cows averaged 665 lbs. milk and 41.5 lbs. of fat. Herds in which there were cows producing over 50 lbs. of fat were owned by the following dairymen: L. R. Campbell, J. J. Van Kleek & Sons, Thos. Williams, John Subbauer, Geo. F. Biersdorf, Wm. Behrman and Robb Bros.

Reports from the Western office of the Dairy Division of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture show that for the previous month the Washington County Association led the Associations in this state and was second highest in the Western Division.

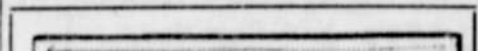
