Aphids by the Bushel Are Caught in Dozer

Corvallis, Ore., May 15.—Vetch aphids are literally caught by the bushel in a simple, home-made dozer devised at the O. A. C. Experiment Station in response to the demand for some way to stop the destruction of the vetch crop in many parts of Oregon.

"This should be the means of saving \$35,000 to \$40,000 to the vetch farmers if you can get the information before them through the press," says Prof. A. L. Lovett, the station entomologist. "If used on the fields at once it will save most of the crop."

The device, 10 feet long or more, consists of a front and a rear section attached to each of them about 18 inches apart. The front section is made as follows: One or more boards form the bottom, which is 18 inches wide. It is mounted on three low runners about 1 1/2 inches high. Wires or light ropes are attached to the front of the outside runners and brought together at the single-tree, which is held high by the breech straps to keep them knocking down the aphids.

The rear section is made just like the front, with the addition of a cloth backstop stretched full length of the board forming the back, and an inch strip is tacked on the front edge of the bottom, to keep the aphids from crawling off.

The operator mounts the horse and drags the dozer over the field, going in a brisk walk. The edge of the first section strikes the vetch stalks near the ground and dislodges many of the insects, which drop on the platform. The plants spring back just as the second section comes along, and receive a double jolt just as they

bend back over the platform. This almost completely knocks the remaining pests to the rear platform.

The aphids are then scooped from the platforms into a vessel and destroyed—either burned or buried.
