## Forest Grove Gets An Honor Flag

blindly followed the dictates of their military masters and one of these propagandists taught that "Permanent peace is a dream and not even a beautiful dream, for the people of a peaceful nation became pitiful, trembling weaklings, who block the way to real manhood." He asked if the people of Forest Grove believed the hundred splendid, broad-shouldered, lion-hearted young men who had enlisted from this city were "trembling weaklings." He didn't believe it and the German war lords would learn the mistake of their false teachers before the war was over.

A song of hate being sung by the Bulgarians teaches the young men to ravish the women of their foes, ride over their discarded bodies with horses and gouge out the eyes of the old men with forks. If this philosophy is to prevail in the world, then the bible is a "scrap of paper" and the saving grace of Jesus Christ is a lie.

The speaker declared the war had brought about a beautiful comradeship in America and she was giving the world a new version of democracy. The allied Christian nations of Europe were depending on America to carry a heavy party of the fighting and feeding and we must Hooverize, buy bonds and help maintain the Red Cross to take care of the victims of Prussian hate. Two weeks ago France's army was in danger of being-discouraged because of a shortage of provisions, but America had temporarily filled the need and we must keep on sending wheat and meat to feed the fighters or the gallant fighters of France must quit.

When the speaker concluded he was given such an ovation as few men have received in this city since the war started.

### The City Fathers Meet and Talk

With all members present, the city administration held its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

After the reading of the minutes and acceptance of the treasurer's report for April, bills aggregating \$1,176.23 were allowed.

Treasurer was authorized to pay the semi-annual interest on 1911, 1913 and 1915 street improvement bonds, amounting to \$1,101.07. Also authorized to take up four street improvement warrants, aggregating \$1,880.40. Also three bonds, aggregating the sum of \$677.20.

Street committee reported that, since the government had taken over the railroads, the Oregon Electric people were not sure they would be permitted to furnish free transportation to the gravel needed to improve West First avenue to the cannery, but, in view of the fact that the cannery had a government contract, the assistance might be given.

Work will soon be resumed on

the hard-surfacing of North Seventh street.

Recorder Dyke read a communication from the Woman's club, asking that less speed be permitted auto drivers in the vicinity of the Lincoln school. Street committee instructed to have signs placed on each side of both the Central and Lincoln schools.

Ordinance committee was instructed to amend traffic ordinance to limit speed in business district to 15 miles and in other parts of the city to 25 miles per hour.

Water meters will hereafter be read monthly, inside city limits, and water committee is to confer with P. U. trustees regarding bad leak in College swimming pool.

Thos. Easter of the North Coast Power company appeared and withdrew his company's offer to wholesale juice to this city, to be distributed by the city at retail prices. He explained that his company had gotten in bad by retailing to one Washington town and wholesaling to another near by town. They did not want the same trouble between Hillsboro and Forest Grove. For his company, he asked permission to appraise the light and power system, with a view to making an offer to purchase same. The appraisal is to cost the city nothing and does not obligate the city to sell. After making it plain that the council would not sell without a vote of the people, the Power company was given permission to make the appraisal.

T. H. Littlehales was appointed to the library board in place of Jo Hurley, who has left the state.

Mayor Paterson stated that the sewer lawsuit would probably be resumed next week and council adjourned.

Charles Roe, a naval recruit, who is taking radio at the University of Washington, visited his parents at Wapato several days last week and on Sunday visited his uncle, C. O. Roe, and family in this city.
