**Mole Pelt Pool**

In order that the boys and girls in the schools who are trapping moles may have the best market for them it is planned to pool the mole skins and sell the large quantity to the highest bidder. Fur dealers much prefer to have the pelts in large quantities than to have numbers of small shipments of only 3 or 4 pelts and they will also pay a premium in order to get them in large quantities. If the mole pelts be brought to the County Agent's office during the week beginning June 3d they will be marketed in the best manner possible. Those desiring to sell them in this way should string them on a stout string and attach a tag on which is placed their name and address. Should any not wish to market the pelts in this way address of the fur dealers can be furnished by the County Agent to whom shipments may be made.

Corvallis, Ore., May 22—"The market page even with its facts carefully concealed by the confusion of buying jobber and dealer prices and miscellaneous classifications, occasionally yields some interesting information," commented Prof. G. R. Hyslop of O. A. C. in glancing over the market reports of a daily paper. "Note the following: Oregon Burbanks, 75c to \$1.25 a hundred; new California, 3 1/2 to 9c per pound.

"New potatoes—watery, relatively low in nutrition, indigestible and full of stomach aches, seven to eight times as expensive as well matured, nutritious Oregon Burbanks.

"There will be ample opportunity after the 1917 crop is no longer useful and before the new crop comes in, to eat plenty of new potatoes from California, which will be much better matured and more reasonable in price.

**Accidental Shooting  
Leads to Lawsuit**

Henry Peterson, aged 18 years, thru his father, C. L. Peterson, has sued Earl Fleischman for ten thousand dollars damages, the suit being filed last Friday in Circuit Court. Young Peterson alleges that on October 6, he, the plaintiff, was with Earl Fleischman in a field, and that Fleischman carelessly, negligently and recklessly pointed a loaded shotgun at him, and caused it to be discharged, the contents tearing into Peterson's left leg, causing him to be sent to the Forest Grove hospital. He says that he endured very much pain, and that his health has been so shattered as a result of the shooting that he must have compensation. He asks for \$10,000 as a verdict.

C. L. Peterson, the father, has been named as guardian ad litem for the purposes of the suit.

C. L. Peterson, the parent, has also sued Fleischman, asking for \$197, segregated as follows—\$65 for hospital charges; \$75 for the surgeon; \$7 for medicine, and \$50 loss of the boy's help.
