**Aged Woman Seeks Damages**

Elizabeth Shute, age 69, is plaintiff in a \$150,000 damage suit filed Saturday morning in the circuit court against her former husband, J. W. Shute, a wealthy retired banker and landowner of Hillsboro. She claims heavy damages, alleging that Shute caused her arrest and examination on a charge of insanity. She was freed of the charge in the Washington county court December 26, 1917, she says.

Shute secured a divorce from his wife about 20 years ago on charges of incompatibility, she asserts. About three years ago, she said, attorneys advised her that the divorce proceedings had been irregular, saying that her husband had not been legally divorced. Acting on this advice, she brought suit against him for substantial support money. This suit was later dismissed by her attorneys without her knowledge, she says.

Last fall she went to another Portland attorney who again advised her that her husband's divorce suit had been irregular, and she went to Hillsboro to see her husband in an effort to make some settlement out of court, she alleges. She asserts that he refused to talk to her and swore out a warrant charging her with trespass. This warrant was not served, but he then charged her with insanity and with being unsafe to be at large, she charges.

A son, A. C. Shute, is president of a bank at Hillsboro, and the family is prominent in Washington county.—Portland Journal.
