Cow-Tester's Report for Month of May

The Washington County Cow-testing Association reports completion of another month's testing and Tester C. H. Bryant gives the following figures: 394 cows were tested during the last monthly period and the average production of milk per cow was 665.5 lbs. The average production of butter fat was 30.8 lbs. Of the total number of cows, 62 produced over 40 lbs. of butter fat and 11 of that number produced over 50 lbs. of fat. The records also show that the average food cost per cow during the month was \$8.61. The three highest producing herds are as follows: Herd of 4 cows owned by A. B. Wescott averaged 1,081 lbs. of milk and 59.5 lbs. of fat; Robb Bros.' herd of 7 cows 697 lbs. of milk and 40 lbs. of fat; Geo. Biersdorf's herd of 11 cows 696 lbs. of milk and 39.8 lbs. of fat. The highest producing cow for the month is "Princess" a Jersey, owned by A. E. Wescott. This cow in the first month of her lactation period produced 1,281 lbs. of milk and 73 lbs. of fat. The highest producing grade cow in the association was "Red Hawk" owned by Bruce Schulmerich, which produced 1,026 lbs. of milk and 57.5 lbs. of fat. Herds in which there were cows producing over 50 lbs. of fat are owned by the following dairymen: Wm. Behrman, L. R. Campbell, Bruce Schulmerich, J. J. Van Kleek & Son, Henry Behrman, A. E. Wescott, Robb Bros. and George F. Biersdorf.

War Savings News

Friday, June 28th at 8:00 p. m. is the time set for Washington county to "go over the top" in War Savings.

The people of Washington county are asked to set aside \$534,000 to be spent after the war is won. In the meantime let the money work to support our boys and our allies at the front.

Each district has been assigned its share on a basis of assessed valuation and population. A district is "over the top" when its quota of W. S. S. has been purchased or pledged. Everyone is expected to help as much as he is able.

Nearly every district has men or women who can take the limit of \$1000 in W. S. S. Others can take \$500 or more. Don't wait for the committee to come to see you and work their heads off to get you to pledge your share. Get right around and see the committee and pledge more than your share and encourage others to pledge liberally. Don't allow those least able to carry the load.

Solomon was absolutely correct when he laid down the principle that a man's heart and his treasure would be in the same place. Investments of time and money are the tests of patriotism. Talk is cheap but it takes money, provisions and ships to win the war.

Eighty-three dollars and forty cents fills a War Savings Certificate. The money helps the government. The material that you would spend it for is kept for the government. So you have really helped win the war doubly, that is to say \$166.80 worth. In five years you get \$100. A profit of \$12.60 for the use of \$83.40 four years six months. In all human probability prices will have swung back to normal or below by that time and your \$100 then will buy at least twice as much of anything

you want as the \$83.40 would buy now. You stand a good chance to make 100 per cent on your investment, so don't get to feeling too sorry for yourself about the duty of buying War Saving Stamps. The more you buy the better it is for you.

During the week June 17 to 22 a series of patriotic rallies will be held over the county. There are people in your neighborhood who have not attended a patriotic meeting. Urge them to go to one of these rallies. Pick up an auto load of people who have no easy way to go.
