War-Time Recipes

At the request of numerous housewives, the following recipes, furnished by Edna L. Mills, home demonstration agent, are published. They have been used successfully by several Forest Grove women:

Oat and Barley Bread

2 cups barley flour,
1 cup oat flour,
1 1-2 teaspoons salt
1 1-2 cups sour milk
3-4 teaspoon soda
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 egg
2 tablespoons syrup, if desired.
Mix dry materials, add milk, syrup and well-beaten egg. Mix well and pour into oiled pans. Let rise 15 minutes and bake 45 minutes in moderate oven. Serve cold.

Mrs. Castner's Cake

1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons crisco
1-2 cup milk
1-4 cup water
2 eggs
1 cup rice flour
1 cup corn starch
2 teaspoons baking powder
Icing—Boil together 1 cup Karo and 1-2 cup water until they form a hard ball in water. Beat over the stiffly-beaten white of an egg. Syrup could be substituted for the sugar by using with it 1-2 teaspoon of soda and omitting the water.
