Hillsboro Boy Killed in France

C. Carroll Gates, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Gates of Hillsboro, died June 12 from wounds received in action on the front in France. Young Gates was with Pershing's forces. This is Hillsboro's first death in the war. He was born in Hillsboro December 31, 1898, and was a graduate of the Hillsboro high school, class of 1917. He enlisted as a volunteer with Company B, Third Oregon, and embarked for France last December.

For several months he was with the supply department but was transferred to Pershing's fighting forces a few weeks ago. He has a brother, Millard, younger, at the front, and is a grandson of Hon. H. V. Gates, a veteran of the Civil war.
