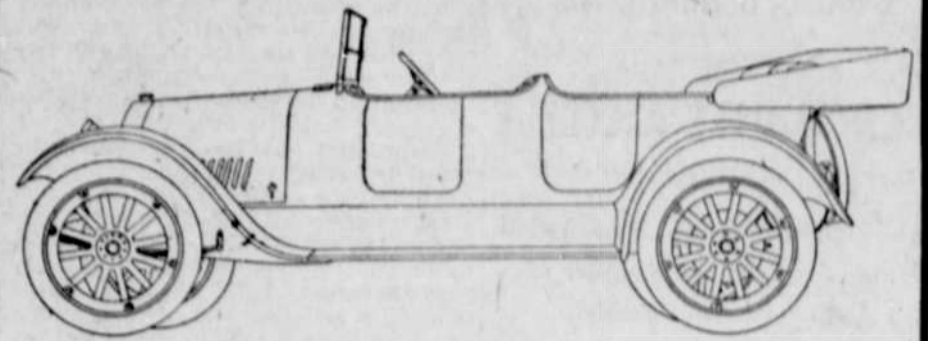

A Great Fruit Country

Lewiston, Idaho,
July 21, 1918.

To the Editor:—

Dear Sir:—Here is a brief account of my sight-seeing in Lewiston and vicinity for miles around. Every Sunday and many evenings for the last two months friends of mine and my daughter's have been kind enough to take us sight-seeing. I have seen more cherries of the Royal Ann and Bing varieties in one day here than I ever saw before in all my life. A great many people have the idea about Idaho, as I did, that Idaho isn't much of a fruit country. They ship tons and tons of cherries, peaches, apricots and apples from here every year. The cherry harvest is about over and the apricots and early peaches are now in the market. Last evening we bought a large water bucket full of early peaches for 25c—nice, large, juicy ones. Peaches will last now until the last of October and I also want to tell you about the bean fields. I have seen one thousand acres in beans alone—a sight worth seeing—and alfalfa, acres and acres of it; also the largest grain fields I have ever seen.

After leaving Lewiston for about two and one-half miles toward the south, you come into the Lewiston Orchards, mostly apples, consisting of ten thousand acres. I want to write you before I forget it, the cherry output from the cannery located in Lewiston paid to its producers eighty thousand dollars. One farmer residing near Lewiston produced fourteen thousand sacks of grain this season—offered twelve cents a sack to get his grain delivered to the Lewiston Milling Co. Owing to the scarcity of help he purchased an auto truck and is handling all the grain himself. And never in the history of this country has there been such an output of new machinery, (consisting of caterpillars and tractors, as well as threshing machines) used as this year.

We have an occasional shower, which has helped the fall grain a great deal. We have a nice war garden which we are enjoying very much. My health is fine here and I am having a good time in general.
