An Important Work

Mrs. Dorothy Seymour has been appointed Registrar of Vital Statistics by the Oregon State Board of Health, to take the place of Dr. Brookbank.

The state laws require the registration of all births and deaths and we cannot be too careful in this matter. Courts require certificates of birth and death in establishing necessary facts concerning pensions, life insurance, titles and rights to inheritance; relations of guardians and wards, disability of minors, administration of estates, etc.

The war has taught us that such matters as citizenship, liability to draft, and being entitled to aid, hinge on the records of this office.

The territory comprises all of Forest Grove, Dilley, Puddin, Gales Creek and Verboort.

Buy Those Stamps

Redeem your pledge, don't wait for a notice.

The War Savings Committee has reported to the state chairman total pledges and purchases of W. S. S. in Washington County of \$534,470. Our quota was \$534,000. This means that every one must absolutely fulfill his pledge and some will have to increase their purchases to make up for those who move away or for some unavoidable reason fail to make good.

Every district chairman will be furnished with a list of names of those pledging in his district with the amounts pledged for each month. Each district will be checked up at stated times. Possession of the stamps is the receipt for purchases. The original pledge cards will be kept on file at the School Superintendent's office in Hillsboro, except in case of some of the towns where the cards may be placed at the post office and banks.
