A Soldier's Letter

Somewhere in France.
July 28, 1918.

Dear Home Folks:

Well, I expect it seems like a long time since you received any word from me but we certainly have been having some busy time. We had a beautiful trip over with no thrills nor any sea-sickness to speak of. The weather was fine and the ocean was very calm and there was lots of moonlight.

We were treated very fine on board and had lots to eat and were served in the most elegant manner. We had our four o'clock tea and seven-course dinner every day and as there were three bands on board we had music at all meals so you see we came over in some style. We had very nice staterooms, in fact travelled first class. The transport was about 600 feet long with six decks beside the hold.

Our trip in England was the most interesting thing I ever did, as it is such a different country and has such different conditions. The houses are all very similar as to size shape and material, being built of red brick. Each home has a small garden and yard that is as clean and orderly as mother's parlor. They are all surrounded by hedges of barberry and holly. The country looks more like a small country town as the farms are just about the size of the yards in Oregon but the soil is exceedingly fertile and wheat, oats, rye and potatoes and all garden truck grow profusely. The hillsides are all laid off into plots of two or three acres by stone fences, neat as a whistle with not a stick or pebble in sight. These plots are pretty well patched with small trees similar in size to our old boxelders but they are oak and English poplar, mostly.

The railroads are miniature affairs with each coach divided into compartments for 1st, 2nd and 3rd class patrons but they surely do go. Sixty miles an hour is not exaggerating, however, troop trains do not run so fast. All crossings are overhead so they have practically no accidents. The people themselves we are not permitted to discuss so I will just have to save that up until later. Of course, the country is just covered with manufacturing concerns and one can see smoke stacks in all directions. We have seen very little of France, but I will write later concerning it. So far it resembles England and really, the natural things of the country here are much like Oregon with the exception of the mountains.

We have had a very strenuous time the last few days in moving so much. I have been able to get very little sleep but we expect to soon be in a permanent camp. The censor is quite strict and I presume the officers who censor their own mail are more careful than the base censors. It surely is going to get mighty lonesome here at times but the way things look at present we hope it won't be very long before we can get back to good old U. S. A. The people are full of handshakes and smiles for all of us here and it is some encouragement to them to see help at hand.

Will close now with lots of love to all.
