A word as to what these institutes are may not be out of place. They are held at various points throughout the state under the auspices of the State Agricultural College at Corvallis. It is ordered by the board of regents that six of these be held annually and the number may frequently exceed this. These meetings are in no way political, they do not represent any faction whatever desirous of putting their principles before the public. They do profess to afford opportunities to farmers on the one hand, and professors of the college on the other, to exchange ideas and experiences in agricultural affairs. They have proven to be one of the best means of enlightenment regarding practical points of farm, garden and orchard. The authorities feeling that they are successful only so far as they are attended by farmers and others, earnestly ask your presence and participation in discussions, with the assurance that such act on your part will prove of mutual advantage to all. These meetings are always perfectly free to all, no admittance fee being charged at the door. There are always points under discussion which interests ladies and, therefore, to the entire public, and to the farmers in particular, a cordial invitation is extended.

DESERTED AND MARRIED AGAIN.

In Detroit Michigan, William A. Baker wooed and won a handsome maid whom, on the 5th day of March, 1885, he led to the altar. At that time Baker was a teamster and his wife an artist. Her knowledge of proterature she imparted to her husband, and in time he became an expert with the camera. Some three years ago Baker moved from Michigan to Washington, settling near Tacoma. About three years ago he bought an outfit and, with his wife and child, a little for their own, three years, went out on the road, working from the Columbia river north and east as far as Spokane, August, 1891, found the tent near Vancouver, Washington, where the child was taken with the whooping cough. The sick one interfered with business and Baker was cross and perhaps done. His mood reacted upon Mrs. Baker, at any rate they had a bit of a quarrel, when it was agreed that he should take the team and tent and strike out while the mother would take the child and go to Orting, near Tacoma. A correspondence was written from Corvallis that he was doing well and wanted his family with him and asked his wife to sell her household goods and ship to Corvallis which could not readily be dissuaded. Baker did not, but received no remittance or invitation to join him. Several letters passed till finally an ultimatum was sent, "send for her or return her effects," consistent of cameras, sewing machine beds, and bedding. To this Baker was unresponsive, and all track was lost of him. It seems as though he had drifted to Wallumina, in Yamhill county, where his tent was pitched for a time. Accidentally Mrs. Baker, this fall, heard that he was there and wrote him, and the post master, the post master answered that he was gone, but that he was married and advised her if she is his wife to look after him. In the meantime, through the wholesale house in Portland, she learned his true address, which, at that time, was Tigardville, this county. Mr. Tigard, the post master, was addressed and put in possession of some historical facts, which necessitated a call from the sheriff. Baker was arrested at Greenfield, this county, and brought before Judge McGowan, where he was met by Mrs. Nellie M. Baker and his six-year-old child. Baker, on the 9th of October wedded Miss Dora Varney, daughter of Rev. Mr. Varney of Sherwood, on a license issued by the clerk of Multnomah county. These facts he admits and they are matters of record as well. His excuse is that he thought his first wife had died and obtained a divorce, but he has been in constant communication with her till within a few months and knew better. He was indicted and arraigned on Tuesday and, pleading guilty, the court sentenced him to the penitentiary for a period of two years. He is about 45 years old and ought to know better. Mrs. Nellie Baker brings testimonials with her from Orting of the very highest character. She says what she now wants is her photographic outfit and what other property that belongs to her. She expresses great sorrow for her own Varnes, who is said to be at Greenfield in a tent sick and among strangers.

POLK COUNTY, Nov. 29.—Haley, near Buena Vista, grows young timber for fence posts. He has several thousand large enough for use.

The Independence Enterprise, a pronounced democratic organ, is soon to appear at Independence. Marvin & Kerton are the projectors.

The West Side has this notice of the plumbing of a new farm house in Polk. It is cheering to read such paragraphs telling of the thrift and comfort among tillers of the soil.

"J. F. O'Donnell has the contract for placing and furnishing the porcelain bath tubs, steel range, corner wash stands, etc., in the J. H. Lewis residence near Crowley."

Several cases of pneumonia are reported about Independence.

McMINNVILLE, Nov. 30.—Captain Bartie, county recorder, is a great book-worm and collector of books. Tuesday he received direct from London three volumes of "Captain Cook's Voyages," with a large illustrated atlas. These give the first printed record of the voyages of Captain Cook and were published by the British government in 1784. They are a curiosity indeed.

The steamer, Toledo, came up Tuesday evening and upon leaving looked like one of the old-time Mississippi river steamers, loaded with merchandise consisting of wheat, straw, apples, potatoes, etc. The railroad is receiving but little freight, and at last it can be said that the McMinnville business men are out of the grasp of this monopoly.

On the fourth Saturday of December, county teachers' institute will meet at North Yamhill.

The heavy rain of Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday has had its effect and all the small streams are over their banks. The Yamhill river is out of its banks also, and is on a rampage, several hundred acres of lowland being already covered, and the river rising all the time. No damages to bridges is expected unless the rains continue.

The assignment of Martin & Sanders and J. R. Sanders, has been recorded. J. R. Sanders was an endorser of Martin & Sanders' paper so the assignment is in connection with the firm. The liabilities of Martin & Sanders aggregate \$16,346, the assets are in the neighborhood of \$6,000. The assets of J. R. Sanders are given at \$26,361, his personal liabilities being \$10,022. The assignment was made to J. J. Henderson.

The prizes won at the fair by our citizens makes them desirous of winning more wreaths of laurel at the midwinter, and so a meeting has been called to discuss the proper methods by which results can be obtained. The meeting is to be held in the court house on Friday, December 8, at 11 o'clock, a. m. A representation from the four West side counties is desired, as it is thought that by the pooling of interests more can be accomplished. George Myers, who made a success for Oregon at the big show, and Dr. Guy Lewis will be here if possible, to address the meeting and set forth the plans formulated by the midwinter fair association. Every farmer and business man in Polk, Yamhill and Washington county, should attend this meeting if possible. Its object is grand and as good results were obtained by making an exhibit at Chicago, the same will follow from an exhibit at San Francisco. The West side counties should not be behind in these matters, as they will because of their isolation, have to accomplish more to advertise their resources than will the East side counties. No overland railway helps us out. We must depend upon ourselves.

Monday, the right arm of Duncan Ross, a prominent farmer living near this city, was amputated just below the shoulder. Some time ago the fingers of the right hand were caught in the gear of a chopping mill and terribly torn. Lived poisoning set in and because of it, the arm was amputated. He is now in a bad condition and the chances of recovery are small, but being a man of powerful physique, there are hopes that he will pull through.

Word arrives from the coast that ducks and geese are there in thousands, and the hunters are having lots of sport. Five large elk were killed on Cape Lookout this fall.

Loads of fruit trees pass through the city every day, it now being the proper time for planting. The prune and the apple seem to have the advantage in numbers, but quite a sprinkling of cherry, peach and pear trees are being set out. It will not be long before the West side counties will be able to supply the Oregon demand and have a surplus for shipment to the East.

The meeting of the West Side Press Club in this city on Friday and Saturday of last week, has demonstrated more than anything else could the benefits to be derived from co-operation on the part of the four West side counties. Already several of our citizens have schemes for advancing the common interests. Let the boards of trade of the West side confer, unite and speed the good work.
