The official returns from the two New York congressional districts, holding elections this week, show that the republicans gained 9,909 votes in one district and 7,182 in the other. Republicans in New York and about Washington are jubilant.

David Crockett wrote just after his defeat for congress by an administration candidate: "I would rather be beaten and be a man than to be elected and be a little puppy dog." The nearness of the next congressional campaign makes the quotation apt.

An election to fill a vacancy in the house of representatives was held this week in two New York districts and one Virginia district. Both New York districts were democratic, but one of them returned a republican. In Virginia a democrat was elected of course.

The New York Herald demands that the U. S. bonds proposed to be issued be split up into small denominations. Great relief! The Statesman thinks the Herald would better advise its party to do something to help the little workmen of this country to buy food in small denominations. The bond question isn't troubling them just now.

The other version of this story is told in an article in another column, copied from the S. F. Argonaut, wherein it is shown how the "change" has reached Harvard.

Mr. Morgan, of Missouri, informed the house Friday last that in general he endorsed the terms of the Wilson bill, but condemned that part which puts bond on the free list. Missouri, you know, is a great lead-producing state. And here the Statesman stops long enough to say that congress is full of democrats who are opposed to the Wilson bill in spots, but in accord with it in general. The spots, of course, apply to the home interest, and the generality of the bill is that part which hits some one else. The trouble is that such opposition can't be depended upon when most needed. The odds are that Mr. Morgan, having made a show of squaring himself with the lead miners of his state, will vote for the bill on passage, and thereby square himself with the administration. If it were not for this uncertainty of the democratic revolt, the defeat of the bill in the senate could almost be confidently predicted.

The Oregon Democrat says that recently Australian wool sold in London at from 9 to 19 cents per pound in the grease. He then asks: "How much tariff duty would be required on this Australian wool to keep it from invading the American market and taking the place of our 65 to 100 cent eastern Oregon wool? May not there be something in quality, after all?" Well, seeing there is an export duty on eastern Oregon wool in the shape of expensive land freights and the promise of free wool in March, the unbiased man can easily see why Heppner wool is worth no more than 6 cents. Say to the Boston manufacturer that he must pay 9 cents in London and 10 cents duty, and he will be willing to go to Morrow county and pay 16 cents for Oregon wool in preference. This howl about quality is stock in trade for the free traders. What does American enterprise and advancement in breeding go for if they are to be outstripped by those people of the southern hemisphere. The sheep in both places sprang from the same stocks, and the grass is not greatly different, while the water in Oregon quenches thirst as on the other side of the equator.

THE EFFECT OF THE TARIFF TINKERING.

An exchange prints, from a letter received by a gentleman at Nashville, Tennessee, from a prominent English capitalist, who had been making investments in the southern states, the following paragraph: "The English and continental people will never invest another dollar in any southern scheme or in any iron or steel enterprise until the American people have picked themselves up and shown the world that they were and are capable of establishing some settled policy. Indeed the disturbing element in America, caused solely by a want of some settled policy, is unsettling values the world over." And yet men cry great is democracy.

SISKIYOU CAVE.

There are few people in the United States who have not heard of Mammoth cave in Kentucky, but there are very many who have never heard of the greater subterranean chamber recently discovered in Josephine county, Oregon. Josephine is a southern county in the state bordering on California, and while the mouth of this great cave is in Oregon, it is not so certain but the innermost recesses are in California. It extends into the Siskiyou range of mountains, a rugged dividing line between Oregon and California. So far as THE INDEPENDENT knows, no name has been given to this wonderful wonder, wherefore "Siskiyou Cave" is suggested.

While no one knows what is under the hill, yet explorations have been made far enough to disclose the fact that Mammoth cave, in Kentucky, is by far its inferior in every way. Captain Smith, its proprietor, a few weeks ago, gave this statement of the progress made in explorations: "We have 600 chambers in sight and an incalculable number to find before we reach the end of the cave. The chambers lie in nine different strata—granite, marble, limestone, redstone and others—and almost every one of the natural apartments contain a marvel of some kind aside from its stalactites and stalagmites. In the 'Lord's supper chamber' there is an almost facsimile in the limestone of the famous painting, 'The fair chamber' is in a strata of California diamonds. 'Tornado chamber,' visited by a wind storm every twenty-four hours. In the 'Rain chamber' there is a perpetual drizzle, the 'Steam chamber' is constantly filled with steam from an undisclosed source. A coffin resting on stalagmites is the feature of the 'Death chamber,' and the 'Bridal chamber' is ornamented with a solid stone four-post bedstead. Then there is 'Sullivan's chamber,' so called because there is a mighty arm and pickaxe in the ceiling, and others too numerous to mention, much less to describe."

In so many windows are articles advertised "only \$1.50," trying to convey the impression that something is offered for nothing, when in truth \$1.50 is all it is worth. Portland has intensified the hard times, by its cry of distress and croaking. Instead of a cheerful business air, her merchants have condemned a long doleful countenance calculated to repel would be customers. Why, if a purchaser enters a store with \$10 in his pocket, expecting to take goods away to that amount the while about hard times will so effect him that he will spend only \$5. Of all times this is the occasion when cheerfulness should obtain.

Three cheers for Admiral Benham. He has done a thing in Rio harbor, Brazil, that makes respectable the American name and flag. He has killed no one, nor yet threatened any one, but when that American skipper asked to be accompanied to the pier, Benham indulged in no quibbling, but went. One report says he had to fire a shot at the insurgents, while his own report recites that the clearing of his decks for action was sufficient. Too long have second and third rate powers claimed the right to bully over us. Another very pleasant incident in this matter, if truly reported, is the request preferred by the Austrian admiral, for permission to help if there was to be a fight. The Germans applauded, but English sympathy, apparently being with the insurgents, is silent. The incident of Monday calls to mind that glorious act of Commodore Decatur in 1815, when he dictated the terms of Bey Algiers.

The republican club of Hillsboro meets this evening to elect delegates to the state club which meets at Portland on the 9th. Like primary conventions, this city club meeting is most important, and no republican ought to absent himself.

INFLUENCE OF A COUNTRY PAPER.

Whether a newspaper has any influence or not is about to be demonstrated at Yamhill county. Four years ago the Telephone-Register, the democratic nominee for county judge and he was elected. After the election the judge snubbed the party organ. Now he wants to be renominated, and no doubt would be willing to receive the assistance of the paper, but he is not getting it to any great extent. It may be true that the influence of a paper may not put ballots enough in the box to elect a candidate, but it will doubtless be shown in this instance that its opposition can defeat.

Speaking of the difference between the tax levies in Yamhill county for 1893 and 1894, The Telephone-Register has this entertaining paragraph: "There is something wrong in this matter, either the assessment of last year was too high or the levy of this year is too low. Economy of this last nature is wrong if it does not pay the running expenses of the county and adds to the indebtedness. Next year will tell the story of this one. But before that time the elections will be over and this low levy will have performed its duty in placing the county judge before the people as an economical person, when even the levy of last year shows up the extravagance of his administration. One year of extravagance and one of penuriousness in the administration of the county affairs will not tend toward a halo of glory for our office-seeking county judge. His own salary has been carefully looked after and drawn, while there are hundreds of men having hundreds of honest dollars owing to them for work rendered that have been unjustly cut out of legitimate bills in order that the last year of his administration can go down to the coming conventions and campaign as an economical one. It would have been better if he had commenced the economical administration in the first year of his reign. The wabbling policy adopted by him in his political life has made him an outcast, and having been elected to the office he now holds by the republican vote of McMinville, that party is welcome to the cold turkey; the democratic party of Yamhill county has no use for the carcass."

John P. Roberts has written a statistical article, published in the Oregon Democrat, on wool prices that have prevailed in the United States for the past sixty or more years. It seems to be temperate and truthful, but it lacks one element of fairness. While quoting American prices he has not given the prices prevailing in free trade England and France. He is pleased to say that on several occasions a raise in the American tariff has been followed by a fall in the price of wool. Mr. Roberts ought to have shown that when the price in protected American fell, it remained stationary in Europe; and he ought to have shown that when protected wool fell, say five cents per pound, it would not have fallen fifteen cents had the tariff been removed.

If not hampered by state instructions, our soldiers and sailors can be left to maintain the dignity of this nation. At Hawaii the naval commander was American, and now at Rio we had a worthy representative to champion our cause, while it is remembered that our flag was not trailed in the turbid waters of Chili.

Mr. Cleveland and the democratic party can, with compassion, see a nation of idle men, but idle money is a different matter. Fifty million idle dollars in New York is to be put at interest, earning the owners a 5 per cent. income. The government can find employment for idle money.

The Wilson tariff bill with the income tax scheme tacked on, was to have been voted on in the house last night. Of course it passed, since the caucus so decreed.

REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

The Republican State Convention is called to meet in Portland Wednesday, April 11th. The Republican District Convention for the first district will meet in Salem Monday, April 9, 1894.

The basis of apportionment has been fixed at one delegate-at-large from each county, and one for each 150 voters and one for each fraction over seventy-five votes cast for the republican presidential electors in 1890. This makes the apportionment as follows:
