The hill at the south end of Meridian street is being cut down and the dirt used on Jackson bottom road. Mr. Dalley has bridged the bank at the south end of Jackson bridge, across Tualatin, so that road is again passable.

A meeting of the executive committee of the Washington County Veterans Soldiers' Association will be held at the office of O. R. Downs, at Forest Grove, on Friday, April 27, at 1 o'clock, to complete arrangements for the soldiers' reunion to be held in Hillsboro on the 3d of May.

The 13th number of Bancroft's World's Fair is at hand. In every respect it is up to the previous numbers, and one can begin to realize what he will have when the work is completed and bound. In book-making it surpasses anything that has been issued from the press.

Messrs. Williams & Hoback have bought out Mr. Heidel, former proprietor of the bakery. It is the purpose of the new firm to stock up with a full line of goods usually carried in connection with a bakery and pies. Mr. Heidel is thinking of going on to his homestead, over toward Vernonia.

Colonel O. Summers spent Wednesday night in town. In the absence of Colonel Beebe, he is commander of the national guard in Portland. The anti-work army was causing some uneasiness in Portland Wednesday, so that Colonel Summers suggested the telephone office most of the evening, but the night passed without an alarm.

The republican club had a field day last Tuesday evening. Mr. Eldman had been expected, but at the last moment something happened so that he did not come. The time of the club was not lost, and the large audience that was at first disappointed rejoiced before the close of the evening. After a few airs had been rendered by the orchestra, Hon. T. H. Tongue was called out, when he uttered some things that have been saying for some time. Probably there are several populists about town who will not be so handy with their tongues as they have been.

John Meyerberg, inventor and patentee of the Highland method of condensing unsweetened milk, met with the citizens of Hillsboro last Friday evening for the purpose of presenting the subject of the starting of a condensed milk factory. To do this it is proposed to incorporate a company with a capital of \$150,000. The wholesale men of Portland propose to subscribe two-fifths of the stock, leaving only 9000 to be raised here. A committee of six, to-wit: F. A. Bailey, J. J. Morgan, W. H. Wehrung, W. A. Laidlaw, Mayor J. C. Hare and H. V. Gates, were appointed to canvass the city to see how much money can be raised toward the enterprise. Mr. Meyerberg stated the initial capacity of a factory that will in part supply the demand at 500 gallons per day. This quantity will enable the company to do a business at a profit. Three hundred cows will furnish that amount of milk year through, though for a few months it would be exceeded.

In connection with the condensing plant there would have to be a small plant for the manufacture of cans, so that altogether, there would be the nucleus of a genuine industrial army.

Superintendent Stanley has completed his report to the superintendent of public instruction, from which it appears that there are in Washington county of school age 3141 boys, and 3631 girls, total, 6772. The average daily attendance at school for the past year has been of boys, 2014, girls, 1974, total 3988. The number of teachers employed during the year has been, men 55, women 95, total, 150. The number of teachers who have taken educational journals, men, 29; women, 55; total, 75. The estimated value of schoolhouses in the county is \$66,535, value of apparatus, including maps, globes, charts, etc., \$11,500. Average amount of salary paid male teachers per month, \$42; amount per month paid female teachers, \$33.50. Amount of money apportioned to school districts out of county fund \$19,938.94, amount apportioned out of state fund, \$5154.40.

CONDENSED MILK PROPOSITION.

The following is the proposition which the promoters of the Condensed Milk Factory are asking subscribers to sign. It will be noticed that it is a liberal proposition, and one that fully protects the stockholders.

We, the undersigned, subscribers for stock in the Condensed Milk Factory to be established in the city of Hillsboro, Oregon, agree to take the amount of stock set opposite our signatures and pay for the same upon the following conditions:

First—That the amount of stock subscribed by residents of Hillsboro and its environs shall not amount to less than nine thousand (\$9000) dollars.

Second—That the merchants and other parties of Portland shall subscribe and pay for not less than six thousand (\$6000) dollars.

Third—That there shall be a contract entered into between the wholesalers and commission men of Portland and the factory whereby the consumption of all products of the factory shall be guaranteed by the wholesalers and commission men entering into such contract.

Fourth—Before any expenditures are made or subscriptions called for, or any business conducted necessitating expenditures in the construction of the factory, a committee of three shall be appointed from among the subscribers to investigate the feasibility and practicability of operating a factory of this nature at Portland.

This committee shall make an estimate of the amount necessary to construct the factory, and unless the project appears feasible and the estimate for constructing the factory shall be under \$15,000, these subscriptions shall not be binding upon the signers.

Fifth—Payment of above subscriptions due as follows: One-third when the above conditions are complied with; one-third sixty days thereafter; and one-third ninety days thereafter.

TIGARDVILLE.

Yesterday Butte Grange, No. 148, P. H. celebrated its 20th anniversary. In 1874 Hon. T. D. Of the charter members there are now but four belonging. Some have moved away, several are dead and others growing weary have dropped out from various causes. During the 20 years passed there has indeed been some gloomy times. Business ventures of which great things were expected failed, some by not adhering to the cash system more closely and others because of ineptness in such matters. But the benefits derived from the Grange in this state can hardly be over estimated. Grange stores that were failures themselves were great factors in bringing down the price of agricultural implements, and once brought down, they never could be raised again, and the social feature of the Grange is a factor in educating the farmer for the many

walks of life while giving a respite to many a weary farmwife from her daily drudgery, enabling her to learn many better and easier ways of performing her daily duties and make home more pleasant. The meeting was called to order by Thomas Paulsen, who briefly stated its objects and introduced the speaker of the day, Hon. R. P. Boise, master of the Oregon State Grange, who reviewed the history of the Grange from its first organization as a body in 1867, he briefly referred to its declaration of purposes and objects and discussed the many advantages derived by the farmers both in and out of the Grange because of its influence. Dinner, such as can only be served by farmers' wives and daughters, was then spread for the 200 or more present. Great credit is due Mrs. E. F. Wood, Miss Lizzie Hohnan and others for the excellent music provided for the occasion.

OBITUARY.
Mary Jane Mulloy was born in Fermanagh county, Ireland, July 13, 1823, and died at her home at Laurel, Oregon, April 23, 1894, of pulmonary bronchitis with catarrhal pneumonia, aged 70 years, 9 months and 10 days. She came to Canada in 1843, and July 13, 1847, was married to Alfred Mulloy. They removed to Rochester, New York, June, 1848, and after making several moves through the eastern and middle states, they came to Oregon in 1871 and in 1872 settled on their place at Laurel, where they have lived ever since. They had born to them eight sons, five of them having preceded their mother to the better shore. She leaves a husband and three sons to mourn her death. She was converted in Iowa in 1857 and united with the M. E. church, of which she was a faithful member until 1880, when she united with the Evangelical church and remained a faithful member until death.

With loving hands we laid her to rest in the cemetery at Laurel and a large crowd of sorrowing relatives and friends. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. H. L. Pratt.
