state legislatures, I have no doubt. But that there is one-fourth as much as these newspapers intimate, I do not believe for an instant. Both these evils must be met and dealt with. The man who preaches assassination and murder must be dealt with upon the same principle as a mad dog.

But while we cherish the memory of their gallant deeds, of their love of liberty and of the sacrifices which they made, let us not forget that we too have a duty to perform; and upon this occasion it is meet and proper that we should take our bearings, as it were, and see if we have kept unimpaired the liberties which our fathers bequeathed to us.

There is another matter now occupying the attention of the American people which is going to require the highest statesmanship of the age for its solution. I refer to the labor question. Conflicts between capital and labor have occurred ever since civilization existed, but it is only within the last twenty years that they have attained such gigantic proportions.

Let us then preserve our free schools and jealously guard every right bequeathed to us by our ancestors, that we may transmit them unimpaired to our posterity, and if we do this, it can, at least, be said of us that we left the world no worse off than we found it.

It is the duty of every government to protect the person and the property of its citizens from the highest to the lowest. It is as much its duty to protect the property of the one as of the other, and any reasoning which leads to a different conclusion is subversive of the ends for which governments are formed.

Let us then, give our moral support to the constituted authorities in enforcing the law for the protection of life and property. But enough of the dark side for the present.
