The Knights of Pythias at Cornelius had a bad streak of fortune years ago when they lost by fire their lodge and furniture. Later they have had some sickness, and though not completely wrecked, they need the use of money. For the purpose of filling the exchequer the lodge gives a dancing party on the evening of December 31st, which will be attended by members of the lodge and invited guests. Tickets of admission including refreshments will be sold at \$1 each. Hendricks' new hall has been secured for the occasion.

Dr. Linklater narrowly escaped with his life Wednesday afternoon. He was coming home and just on the brow of the little hill this side of the McElldowney farm, when hearing a cracking above the noise of the wind among the trees, he looked upward and to the side and saw an old dead tree coming toward him. He reached for his whip which started one of his horses that dreads the lash, and the animals were soon in a run. The motion was not so rapid for the buggy had cleared the spot when the old rotten trunk crashed across the road breaking into a dozen pieces. The doctor did not recover from his scare for three hours.

P. B. Pomeroy, (Duck) living on Sauvie's Island, has been arrested charged with robbing a store at La Canas, on the Columbia river, in Washington. The goods found in the value of \$100, were found in Pomeroy's trunk on the island. Two other men were arrested with "Duck," named A. Anderson and Henry Swearing, but at Portland they were released and held as witnesses. The Multnomah county sheriff, Sheriff Sears, of Multnomah county, has directed his energies and with so no prospects of success. He confronted "Duck" with a gun, and coolly informed him that if he desired to save his skin he might show just where other articles were concealed. To avert this catastrophe, the criminal revealed the hiding place, which was a cunningly arranged double bin. A search warrant would never have disclosed its secret hiding places and but for the determination, of Sheriff Sears to find the bin, the false bottom would have remained in place. But Pomeroy saw the cold, hard, unyielding gaze of the peace officer and maintenance of the peace officer gave up his secret. The "things" were found, and a lot of them. With the discovery the name of Dwight Pomeroy was mentioned and one out, he was a man that Sears wanted. To get him caused a trip to Hillsboro. The officers left willing aid the car, and soon Dwight was arrested. Mr. Sears, yesterday morning, turned to Portland yesterday morning. Wild rumors of others being implicated were rife, but in a free talk with Mr. Sears on Wednesday evening, he mentioned no names of others that he wanted, and seemed satisfied with his own. He said he would surely go over the road, and if he found some blunder in indictments, it will be amended that the Pomeroy were arrested a year ago for stealing with a gun, but got off with a fine. It is hoped that the gang—if that is the proper term to use—will be broken up by the law. The proper term to use is that the gang—which has been engaged in petty pilfering in this county the past two years.

Some two years ago an effort was made to establish a free library and reading room in Forest Grove and while a goodly number of books were collected, the enterprise failed because of a lack of money to employ a paid librarian. But lately a number of citizens of the school town have joined their efforts for another attempt and this time with better prospects for success. A library and reading room has been fitted in Veri's Hall building. All the old books have been collected and catalogued, together with new donations including a request of fifty volumes from a Mr. Henderson of Los Angeles, Cal., mostly scientific treatises. There are now 500 volumes in the collection listed, including some of the best popular monthlies. There is yet room on the shelves for useful books. The library is free to the public subject only to a few simple rules adopted for its preservation. That is, books must be returned after holding them two weeks. This reasonable regulation is enforced by a fine of five cents per day assessed for each day it is kept over that time. All damages must be made good either by a new volume or its cash equivalent. These books may be taken to the home for perusal. The reading room is open two days and evenings in the week for transient visitors and for drawing and returning books. Any one having books which will place on the shelves may send them to the library in the care of Mr. D. C. Stewart, who will see that they are properly listed.

The relation which price bears to quality in literature is made obscure by the Christmas Cosmopolitan. Stories by Rudyard Kipling, Wm. Dean Howells, Mrs. Spencer Trask, Mrs. Barton Harrison and Alphon W. Forges are interspersed with poetry by Sir Edwin Arnold, Edmund Clarence Steadman and James Whitcomb Riley, while through the numbers are scattered illustrations by such famous artists as Remington, Toche, Reinhardt, Turner, Van Schick, Gibson and Stevens. A series of portraits of beautiful women of society illustrate an article on "The Relations of Photography to Art," a travel article by Napoleon Ney, grandson of the famous Field Marshal; one of the series of Great Passions of History, to which Froese and Giese have already contributed, and half a dozen others equally interesting, go to make up the attractions of the number. The Cosmopolitan people say: "We might charge you more for this number, but, in all frankness, could we give you better material, better illustrated, if we charged you a dollar a copy?"

Sheriff Ford has been searching high and low for a month or more for Hugh George, the man who so boldly entered the dining room of Farmer Lepschatt, in the fall, and held up the family while a search of the premises was made for money. George seemed to sink into the earth, but at last Mr. Ford got a hint of his whereabouts and asked the Seattle officers to take him into custody. Late Monday evening the Sound sheriff called Mr. Ford to the telephone and told him that he had his man, and would hold him six months if a warrant was telegraphed for the Christmas holidays would make obtaining a requisition slow work. Mr. Ford went to Salem Wednesday for the necessary authority, and will at once go to Seattle, going by the way of Olympia. He may be expected home tomorrow or Monday with the hold robber.

Some inquiry has been made about the diptheria cases that occurred recently in the German settlement, south of Cornelius. Dr. Bailey, the attending physician, informs us that there were twelve cases in all, occurring in three families. There was one death, which occurred in Shierman's family; the others are now convalescent. In all three of the families, parts of the false membrane were detached and examined under the microscope by Dr. Bailey, at his office, and showed unmistakably the characteristic bacilli of diptheria. The little girl who died was beyond hope before the family knew the nature of her ailment, or called for medical aid, and hence the cause of exposure of others to the contagion.

Christmas was generally observed at the homes in the city. By 11 o'clock a. m. the streets were deserted, the people being about their home firesides. At the Congregational church the little folks were served with candies and nuts. To pay for this they had prepared for the entertainment of their elders a short literary exercise. Several of the classes in the Christian church Sunday school were entertained at the residence of the Misses Rose, the occasion being a very pleasant one. The weather was very pleasant, though on Christmas morn there was a heavy frost. There was no snow nearer than the Coast mountains.

A young man, named Dilley, broke into Wescott's butcher shop at Forest Grove on Tuesday night, and carried away a lot of bacon hams. When the loss was discovered, suspicion rested on him and a search of his premises was made, but he was not arrested and bound over to appear at the next term of the circuit court in bonds of \$150. He obtained bail and is now at liberty.

COURT HOUSE NEWS.

LAW COURT.

In re admission of John Grassen to citizenship; upon the testimony of witnesses the said applicant is found worthy and is admitted to citizenship.

In re admission of Abraham Grassen to citizenship; witness examined and the applicant found worthy. Was admitted to citizenship.

PROBATE COURT.

Estate Miles Davies, deceased; final account examined; allowed. Ordered that the bondsman be exonerated from further liability, executors fully discharged and the estate closed of record.

Estate George L. Stevens, deceased; Maria Stevens, widow of deceased, waiving her right, Nicholas Stevens is appointed administrator, with bonds fixed at \$750. The bonds filed and approved with W. V. Wiley and John Northrop for sureties. R. Crandall, L. A. Whitcomb and Geo. Ireland were appointed to be appraisers of said estate.

Estate E. C. Bonham, deceased; report of administrator filed. Bondsman Leach asking to be released from the administrator's bonds, the administrator is allowed until December 31st to file a new bond.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Bertha Figg v. Albert Figg; defendant's demurrer to the complaint was overruled. It was further ordered that the cause be referred to L. K. Adams as referee to take and report testimony and report same on or before January 21, 1895.

Joseph Gaston v. J. P. Applin & Sons; the defendant's demurrer to complaint is sustained. The court finds that it has no jurisdiction of the cause of suit alleged in such complaint. Ordered that plaintiff have twenty days in which to further plead.

The Bank of Forest Grove v. C. B. and Lola Stokes; referred to C. E. Ransom to take testimony and report the same by January 21st.

John Rumschick v. Frank Gray; defendant's demurrer to complaint argued and submitted to the court and is taken under advisement.

Cardens Bros. v. J. A. Reid; ordered that plaintiff have judgment against J. A. Reid for \$50, and that his interest in the real property described in the complaint be sold to pay the same.

Meier et al v. W. O. Hocken, judgment for the defendant for his costs and suit dismissed.

J. B. Jones v. Caroline M. Cowgill et al, sheriff's sale of real property continued.

In re Jacob Anderson, insolvent; ordered that Jacob Anderson be discharged from further liability on account of any indebtedness existing against him prior to making the assignment herein.

Joseph Fessler, administrator, v. Hans D. Kock; on motion, Washington county and Carlisle Koller are made defendants in this cause.

Mary E. Birdsell v. L. L. Whitcomb et al. The default of defendants, J. L. and Elizabeth Whitcomb, J. A. Keld, Mary Ann John Kellier and C. P. and Lenora Hogue was entered. It is further ordered that D. W. Collins and J. C. Hall have no interest in the lands described in complaint, and that the cause be continued for service on John D. and Mary Doyle.

In re Willoughby Bros., insolvent. Ordered that the assignee be discharged and the estate closed of record.

H. Wehrung & Sons v. Julia L. Lemmie et al. The default of the defendants was entered.

Patrick Ring v. Barney Leis. The findings of the former jury are set aside and a new trial is granted.

John C. Tier v. Theo. Schaffenberg. Defendant's demurrer to the complaint and the plaintiff allowed twenty days to further plead.

Court adjourned till January.
