Supt. Rowland informs Judge Cornelius that John Derrick, who was committed to the insane asylum from this county October 12, 1894, died on the 7th inst.

Next Sunday is Easter. The occasion demands something extra in the way of ladies' hats and bonnets. Mrs. Vroman has the latest and most becoming styles.

At the town election held in Cornelius last week, the officers chosen were, for president of the council, J. R. Miller; councilmen, J. W. Clark, Thomas Talbot, M. H. Henderson and G. Vickers; recorder, J. T. Lorrain; treasurer, Nelson Wilcox.

The tax roll is now in the hands of the sheriff for a period of thirty days, which will expire about the first of the month. Sheriff Ford is anxious to get as much money as possible before they become delinquent. The collections of the first day amounted to \$2,400, but those of the second day fell nearly a thousand short.

In a brief conversation with Mr. Merchant, of North Yamhill, had a few days ago, he stated that beef cattle are becoming scarce in the Willamette valley and that prices are greater than a few months ago. The worst of it is, too, there is no prospect of the supply increasing this year. The calves must have time to grow to steers, and that is fully four years.

Calvin Pomeroy, who, on Monday last, was sentenced on the verdict of the trial jury to four years in the penitentiary, has taken an appeal to the supreme court. Furnished bonds in the sum of \$3000, with Henrietta Pomeroy, Adam Stump, Wm. Levech, S. A. Holcomb, Flora Pomeroy and W. A. Kirtz, as sureties. He is now at liberty pending the hearing of his appeal.

A hand book of Louisiana, containing fifty-eight pages has been received. It is not a very fine specimen of job printing, yet it appears to be well-written and modestly and with apparent candor describes the advantages which the state possesses calculated to lure the immigrant. It was written for the State Immigration Association by Dr. Wm. C. Stubbs, director of the State Experimental Station. It is sent to applicants without cost, who write the State Immigration Association, 620 Common St., New Orleans.

Rev. F. J. Strayer returned this week from the state conference of his church, held in Portland. The statistics of the church show that there are in Oregon sixteen missions with about fifty preaching stations. In the conference there are twenty ministers. The church enrolls about 1000 communicants. During the past year there have been about 200 accessions. The value of the church property is involved at \$12,000. The church has one school, La Fayette academy, in Yamhill county, which Rev. C. C. Poling has been elected principal. In the conference there is one district presided over by Elder M. J. Valentine, who was elected at this conference for a term of four years. The conference sent Rev. H. L. Pratt to the Hillsboro circuit. Rev. Strayer goes to the Yaquina Bay circuit.

The Young Men's Republican Club of Forest Grove held an enthusiastic meeting on Tuesday evening last at which the following delegates were chosen to attend the state convention of clubs, to be held in Portland May 22d, viz: Gen. T. J. Thorp, I. A. Macrum, Aaron Wells, W. S. Ingles, M. D. Markham, E. W. Haines, W. E. Bowdler, W. A. Goodin, Geo. R. Hughes, A. T. Knox, F. S. Barnes, Austin Craig, O. L. Ahlstrom, J. C. Greer and E. B. Sappington. The club also selected officers to serve during the next campaign, to-wit: Gen. T. J. Thorp, president; W. S. Ingles, vice-president; Austin Craig, secretary; and M. D. Markham, treasurer. The president was authorized to appoint all necessary committees, which will be done later on. While no formal action was taken, the club let it be understood that it is the desire that of Washington county Republicans that a delegate to the national convention of clubs should be a citizen from this county.

Miss Emma Smith, step-daughter of Mr. Pate, living at Cornelius, who works in the family of Mr. John Sewell, living three and a half miles east of town, was seriously hurt last Saturday by a gunshot wound in the thigh. While their elders were in town in the afternoon, Miss Emma amused Mr. Sewell's 12-year-old boy by shooting at a mark. The boy had taken his shot at the mark and had loaded the gun for the young woman. He thinks that at this point she ran before the gun, when his thumb slipped off the hammer, discharging the piece. The ball struck the heavy muscles of the upper thigh just opposite the great bend of the femur bone. The bullet glanced on the bone, and ranged forward and downward, fortunately missing all arteries. Dr. F. A. Bailey was at once called. The bullet is deeply imbedded in the tissues, and although he searched along its path for six or more inches, he could not find it, but he thinks now he has it located. Unless a violent inflammation is set up, he will not disturb it, but let it encist, which very frequently occurs in gunshot wounds.

Mrs. H. E. Foster, a widow, 65 years of age, living at Progress, a cross-roads near Beaverton, met a frightful death on Saturday evening last, by being thrown from a buggy and dragged nearly a mile under the wheels of a runaway horse. In company with Mrs. Richard McKay, a neighbor, and a little granddaughter, Mrs. Foster visited Portland Saturday to do some shopping and visit relatives. The horse driven by her has been owned in the family for fifteen years, and was regarded as a good animal, although, on rare occasions, it indulged in some kicking tricks, but was not considered dangerous. On the return home in the afternoon, when about half a mile this side of Mount Zion church, the horse indulged in some of his kicking antics, and was more than usually unruly. The first kick tore off the dashboard and one of the forewheels broke down, throwing Mrs. Foster and her little granddaughter into the air. The child was fortunate, and has a badly cut face. As the wheel broke Mrs. Foster was thrown forward over the broken dashboard, her head striking the shaftboard, and her hair caught in the trackbars. Her body fell under the forewheels, and unable to extricate herself, she was dragged for nearly a mile before the horse was stopped by a Mr. Rogers, who rushed into the road on seeing the runaway, and, seizing the animal by the bits, brought him to a stand. Mrs. Foster was dead, her body badly lacerated and many bones broken. The body lay in the road until Coroner Cornelius, of Multnomah county, was summoned, who quickly responded and had the remains taken to the morgue. The grandchild was also taken to the morgue, and a doctor of the name of Portland, for medical attendance. Mrs. Foster had lived at Progress and in that vicinity for many years, and her frightful death has proved a great blow to the scores of friends, who have shown the greatest affection for the lady and keenly regret her demise.

The March term of the circuit court for this county adjourned on Wednesday. The docket had been a long one, and there were some long cases. Notably the Oregon Iron & Steel Co. damage suits, which required five days for trial, but notwithstanding this, a large number of cases were disposed of, and the docket has not been as nearly cleared in several years. The continued cases are few compared with some former terms of the court. Judge McBride has several cases under advisement, but his work is only a few weeks in arrears. This is different from the conditions of the courts in other districts. In some of the Eastern Oregon circuits the judges are a year behind. The same is true of some of the departments in Multnomah county.

On the Southern Pacific Company's lines 24,000 will hereafter be the minimum weight upon which railroad rates, tariff or special, will apply, except when otherwise specifically provided for. Cars loaded to full space capacity will be considered a carload, and subject to a minimum of 24,000 pounds, except when minimum carload weight under the western classification is less, in which case the western classification will govern.

Bishop W. M. Stanford, of Harrisburg, Penn., will preach in the Evangelical church of Hillsboro, Friday, April 12th, at 2:30 p. m., and in the evening, same date, in the M. E. church at 7:30. As the bishop is a very entertaining speaker, no doubt a large congregation will greet him. A public collection will be taken for the bishop's traveling expenses.

Sheriff Ford has adopted a new device for retaining memoranda of tax receipts. Instead of the old style stub he has a book of duplicate receipts printed, then by the use of a sheet of carbon paper he makes a complete copy of the receipt. This not only saves the time heretofore required for writing a stub, but the duplicate is an exact copy of the original.

Last week, Mr. Frank McElowney sold a span of horses, Duke of Winlock stock, in Portland, for \$350. They stood 16 hands high, and weighed 1400 pounds each. Considering that Cayuses and culls sell for from \$25 to \$35 each, McElowney received a fair price, but it only is another indication that blood will tell. There is money in good stock.

The writing department of Pacific University, in charge of Prof. Garrison, closed last week at which time a contest was held, resulting as follows: Most improvement, Miss Nannie Wilkinson; best lady writer, Miss Emma Gordon; Mr. Walter Hansen, best gentleman writer.

The people in the road district embracing Scholl's complain because they are not warned out to do road work. The roads are in need of repairs, but so far they have not been touched, except, perhaps, on the main road leading from the Tualatin to Portland.

Miss Lucy Lammason, a student at Forest Grove, started from that place for Nehalem, where she will teach a four months' school. She is visiting her friends, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Adams, in Astoria, and will leave Saturday morning for Tillamook bay.

The colt show will be held at Forest Grove on the first Saturday in June, 1895. In addition to the usual premiums, the society has in contemplation the offering of a gold medal for the best colt shown, free for all of this jurisdiction.

Mr. R. L. Wooster, who has been in business here for the past dozen or fifteen years, started for California last week for an indefinite leave of absence. While away he will visit several places in Southern California, and if a good business opening presents, he will not hesitate to fill the gap. His many friends bespeak a pleasant vacation.

Hon. H. V. Gates returned home last Wednesday evening from his California trip. On his way back he stopped at Linkville and signed a contract for putting in an electric light plant. He thinks it strange that the thing has not before been done seeing that coal oil sells for 40 cents per gallon, and such a magnificent water power at hand. Mr. Gates pronounces the water power at Linkville the best in the United States. The volume is not as large as Niagara, but it is large enough and easier controlled. There is a great future for Klamath county, lacking but two things for its development—population and modern means of transportation. Either one will bring the other. The railroad company that goes into that section will reap a rich reward.

The Southern Pacific Company has commenced putting in a passenger station at Hillsboro, and some necessary side-tracks. A telegraph station will also be included with the new things. The old station house has been moved back so as to leave room for a side track between the main track and the buildings. The waiting room is an entirely new structure, built on the west end of the freight house. The foundation of brick is nearly finished. The clearing of the stumps mentioned last week has been completed. Forest Grove is to be treated as well. These improvements, though long needed, are the immediate result of the introduction of the Gates bill in the legislature, requiring stations to be built at towns of 500 inhabitants and upwards. It is true the bill did not become a law, being killed in the senate, but the railroad companies recognized the justice of its requirements and voluntarily build the houses.

Side Talk at the Horse Parade.

At the twenty-first annual meeting of the Western Oregon Horse Society there were present a good turnout of horse owners, and the stock interests were carefully gone over. The amount of stock on hand has been largely reduced since the last annual meeting—more noticeable in cattle, though the stock of horses has been reduced something like 10,000 in the North Pacific, and the members of the society generally concede that the scrubs will have to be further reduced before a good, healthy one can be given to the horse market. Regrets were expressed that all manner of produce of the farm, some of which is rotting for want of a market, is for want of a concert of action of shippers and producers not made to bring all the money possible and distributed among the producers, so that flowing through regular channels relief from money pressure can be had.

Viewing the success of California through her state organizations for marketing her produce, the utter lack of organization in the North Pacific makes our markets unstable, our produce the subject of private speculation to the end that a majority is wasted and the producers utterly disheartened without giving permanent relief to our commercial pursuits or laboring masses. All felt that it is utterly useless to talk about diversified industries and diversified farming, unless a more systematic means of shipping and marketing be established at home and abroad. All persons present thought that after shipping and handling expenses were deducted to a reasonable amount what we have to sell should bring every producer what he affords.
