The State Medical Association held its annual meeting this week in Portland. Drs. F. A. Bailey and J. P. Tammie were in attendance from Hillsboro.

Mrs. J. H. Stanley and Miss Lucy Humphreys will start to-morrow for Monmouth, to attend the commencement exercises of the State Normal school. The ladies will drive up in a buggy, taking two days for the trip.

Mrs. E. C. Hughes, Mrs. W. N. Barrett and Dr. W. D. Wood attended Grand Lodge of the Eastern Star Chapter, which convened in Portland on June 10th, 11th and 12th, as delegates from Tualatin Chapter, No. 31.

Dr. A. B. Bailey and R. Burns started Wednesday noon for a two weeks' fishing boat on Three Rivers, a tributary to the Nestucca. Jack Freeman was to meet them at McMinnville, he having gone that far on the cars.

For the month of May it took 224 pounds of milk to make one pound of butter, at the Hillsboro creamery. This high average was not expected for the spring month, and shows the high grade of cows owned in this neighborhood.

Reports from several of the parties who received camellia root for experiment, are very flattering. The plant is making a vigorous growth. It seems to be adapted to this climate. The harvest should be the critical time for examination.

Mr. Withycombe has made a splendid map for the county, and a valuable reference authority for the county. It could not have been bettered only by taking a later date for a basis of work. This would, however, have greatly increased the cost.

Mr. J. C. Her, of the firm of McConnell & Her, Sherwood, was in town on Wednesday. He was one of the sufferers by the late fire, and lost goods worth about \$3,000. They saved about \$100 of stock. Their insurance is \$2,000 more, which will enable them to resume again.

Dr. Linklater was called this week, at the instance of Dr. Ward, in consultation at the bedside of Mrs. Heister, of Forest Grove, who is very ill from so simple a wound as cutting a toe while trimming a corn. This occurred some time ago, but blood poisoning is now threatened, and serious consequences may follow.

E. DeWitt Connell, who has been at Philadelphia the past three years attending lectures at the medical department of the University of Pennsylvania, received the degree of M. D. from that university, on June 13th. Dr. Connell, brother-in-law of Dr. Wood, of this city, contemplates spending another year East before returning to Oregon.

A large number of citizens from the towns on the west side went to Salem last Sunday on the R. R. conductors excursion. Eight coaches gathered all that could be packed into them between McMinnville and Portland, and many who desired to go could not get on the cars. The excursion is said to have been admirably managed, but Salem was not able to care for the people. Those who depended on finding something to eat there were disappointed.

The annual commencement concert, by the Choral Union, of Forest Grove, will be given Wednesday evening, June 14th. COURT HOUSE NEWS.

COUNTY COURT.
Alice Cummings v. Baker & Nels N. Sherwin's sale of real property confirmed.

George Smithley, insane. From the testimony of witnesses and the report of the examining physician, Dr. E. A. Bailey, the court finds that the defendant is sane, wherefore he is released and acquitted of the charge.

J. H. Reed v. Frank Hausman; action for possession of personal property. Judgment for plaintiff for possession of promissory notes, and out of pocket expenses, and the owner of horses, wagon, harness and shoes, and that he recover off and from plaintiff his costs.

Estate of Alfred C. Wilkins, deceased. Monday, July 15th, set for hearing objections to the final account. On motion of L. K. Adams, attorney, the matter of said account, and J. C. Kinman, proponent, is ordered to be dismissed.

COMMISSIONER'S COURT.
Location of road No. 329; remonstrance dismissed. Claim of Wm. Lowe and John DeHess for damages, filed. The objection of petitioner's attorney not allowed, and J. Morgan, J. C. Corey and J. W. Smith appointed viewers to meet at Gales Spur, June 25th, at 10 o'clock, a. m., to view and report how much less valuable the lands of said petitioners will be by the establishing of said road.

Change of the Hillsboro and Jolly mill road. Ordered that E. F. McSally, W. H. Connell and George Sinclair be appointed viewers to meet the county surveyor, June 23d, to view, survey and report the proposed change.

Monthly reports of Clerk Goodin, Recorder McCormick and Sheriff Ford, filed and approved.

Application for rebate on taxes of John Milne, C. H. H. and Ludwig Stoltz, dismissed.

Application of Pat Dooley for admission to poor farm. The application is adjudged to be a pauper and is admitted to poor house till the further order of the court.

Resignation of Joseph Raycraft, constable of Gales Creek district, accepted.

Application to vacate first street, in town of Gaston, dismissed.

Application Wilson river boom toll road, for new rates of toll. Dismissed for the reason Washington county has no jurisdiction of a road lying in Tillamook county. Washington county will not establish rates of toll on the six miles lying in this county, and the citizens traveling such six miles must be allowed to do so free of charge.

Application of Wm. Ridgeway et al. for building new bridge on Gales creek. Continued.

Application of John Northrop for pay for keeping James Warren; \$10 allowed.

Application of Rosa Frost for pay for keeping Beat boy. Sum of \$5 allowed.

Application of M. Wren for relief for Andrew Olson allowed, in the sum of \$5 per month, until further order of the court.

Application of W. C. Kerton, supervisor of district No. 26, for road lumber; 125 feet allowed.

Application of D. Martin, for road lumber. Continued.

Resurvey of road No. 234. Ordered that J. A. Young, Geo. H. Reeves and W. A. Kirts be appointed viewers to meet county surveyor, on June 20th, and re-survey road No. 234, and report the same.

Report of John Withycombe, C. E., employed to make a county map. The map is approved and accepted, and \$100 appropriated to pay for the same, as per contract.

Application of John Long for repayment of tax doubly assessed. Continued.

Resignation of Henry Gardner, supervisor of district No. 47, accepted.

Application of H. T. Johnson for powder, to be used in road district No. 1. Allowed to the amount of \$10 worth.

State v. R. Alexander et al. Fees allowed, except \$1.25 of J. P. bill, and \$6.80 of constable bill.

State v. Ed Smetzer. Expenses allowed, except \$1 of J. P. fees, and \$2.50 per acre. The total expense be put at \$12.50.

Dr. Adkins, dentist, who during the past few months has had business interests that have called him away from town, has his affairs so adjusted that he will now be in his office regularly, and prepared to do all work that patrons may place with him.

TAX-ROLL FOR 1894.

At the last term of the county court the delinquent tax-roll was reported by Sheriff Ford. It is about \$3,000 less than it was last year.

The roll as received by the sheriff in April was for \$81,493.45; sheriff assessments were \$628.30; total roll, \$82,121.75. Of this the sheriff collected and paid to the treasurer, \$74,407.84; the county remitted \$207.49; leaving delinquent, \$9,506.53. Considering the times this is a good showing.
