Mr. E. R. Doughty, of Bay City, Tillamook county, is visiting with friends in Hillsboro this week. Mr. Doughty graduated at the State Agricultural college this year. He is interested in insect life, and curiously looks through the half pint of bugs that are found in the globes of the electric lights. Several interesting specimens were found, which he will add to his already large collection.

An observer versed in farm lore calls attention to the fact that every blade of an oat straw is distinctly marked with the letter "B." Remembering further back, in 1861 the blades were marked "W," which in the light of subsequent history, has been interpreted "War." Adopting the same liberal interpretation to this year's marking, "B" stands for "better times." It is queer that the green blades should be thus marked.

Sunday afternoon, a team from Johnson's livery stable in Forest Grove, driving a carriage in which sat three ladies and a gentleman, met, on the long bridge spanning the river, a freight wagon, loaded with boxes. The carriage horses took fright and commenced to back. They wrenched the sideboards from the bridge by backing, and pitched carriage and load to the ground below, a distance of sixteen feet. The team broke loose from the wagon and did not go over, but it did go toward Cornelius. One lady jumped out on the bridge. The others went over. Fortunately, none were seriously injured.

The Oregon Fruit Union's circular, No. 25, of date, July 1st, is out. It speaks hopefully of the future of the Black Republican cherries in greater demand than Royal Anns, and are proving to be the best shipping fruit. The experiment of shipping peach plums is to be made. These plums are favorites of the East, and it is thought that the Oregon product will be sought. It is probable, though, that the Columbia plum will be a better variety. Early peaches from Oregon are proving a failure, since they have to compete with the California fruit. The Union makes complaint of imperfect cherry packing. Cherries must be packed tight. A box of cherries that will rattle is sure to spoil.

The Oregon Fruit Union's circular of June 29th gives these prices as those prevailing at that date for seasonable shipping fruit: Sales of cherries to-day in eastern markets generally \$1.25 per box. Santa Helena cherries, 30 cents; Butte cherries, 75 cents; Spokane cherries, 75 cents; blackberries, \$2.25; raspberries, \$3.00. Three cars of peaches arrived in Spokane this week, selling to-day for 30 cents. Portland cherries for shipping, selling 3 cents; currants 2 cents to 3 cents; raspberries, 24 cents to 3 cents. Wild blackberries are bringing no fixed price, being sold, which makes no market. One crate of these arrived from Eastern shipments of currants have not arrived in good condition; it will not pay to ship this fruit if very ripe, and we advise no further shipments. Grande Ronde straw hats are selling in Montana and all Lake points in the way from \$1.50 to \$2.50, but most arriving in poor condition. Great care must be taken in shipping early peaches and grapes; especially, should not be packed for four to six hours after cutting. Prices on peaches will not increase, but are likely to go as low as 75 cents in some markets. The price will be governed greatly by California arrivals.

CITY COUNCIL.

The city council met in regular session Tuesday evening—all present except Councilman Frost. The Light & Water Co. filed its June bill, \$120.50. W. Redmond, marshal, June bill, 25.00.

Total, \$145.50. The bills were referred to the finance committee.

The finance committee reported favorably on the following bills: Light & Water Co., May bill, \$120.55. C. W. Redmond, marshal, 30.00. Hillsboro Co-Operative store, 33.00.

M. S. Daily, laying roadway, 66.15. Perry Gardner, hauling, 7.00. Finley Cummings, labor, 4.70. Wm. Patz, 3.25.

Total, \$324.65. The marshal was authorized to appoint four deputies for the 3d, 4th and 5th of July, at a salary of \$2.00 per day.

The marshal was instructed to decorate the city hall for the 4th inst. A license to sell spirituous liquors was granted to C. Blazer for a period of six months, and the recorder was instructed to issue the same when the treasurer's receipt for \$200 license fee shall have been filed.

Councilman Tamsie introduced and moved the adoption of this resolution: Resolved, That the council will issue \$15,000 in negotiable 6 per cent gold-interest bonds, due in twenty years, interest payable semi-annually, and will sell the same at any time during the next thirty days to H. E. Noble, or any one he may designate, at 98 cents on the dollar.

Councilman Brown seconded the motion to adopt.

The vote stood, ayes, Stanley, Brown—2; nays, Bailey, Tamsie, Downs—3. So the motion to adopt the resolution was lost.

OREGON WEATHER REPORT.

WESTERN OREGON.

Weather—Rain fell on Sunday over the northern portion of the Willamette valley, that is, in Clatsop, Washington, Multnomah and Columbia counties; it also fell along the immediate coast; the amount of rainfall varied from a trace to .06 of an inch, not being sufficient in most localities to lay the dust. A thunder storm, accompanied by rain, occurred in the southern portion of Jackson county on Wednesday, the 26th ult.; over a small area the rainfall was very heavy. The temperature gradually rose from Monday to Thursday, when the maximum for the week occurred; on this day it ranged from 92 to 101 degrees, the latter prevailing at Grants Pass. From Friday we experienced a fall. Monday the maximum temperature was from 65 to 75 degrees. The minimum temperature during the week ranged from 50 to 64 degrees.

The weather has been generally clear up to Saturday; the winds have been variable and very dry, in velocity from 5 to 14 miles an hour. The dews have been heavy at night.

Crops—The warm weather caused a very rapid growth and development of grain. The crops are generally very promisingly favorable to yielding; the clover and alfalfa crops have all been cut and put away; the timothy and cheat will be cut during the next ten days. Fully the largest hay crop ever cut in Oregon will be had this year.

The grain crops are in fine condition. Spring grain would, of course, be benefited by rain, but the absence of rain will do no material injury. Fall wheat and oats have headed, and bear promise of heavy yields. In Jackson county the grain crop promises well, though it appears to be poorer in that county than in any other, this fact being due to the absence of rain. Jackson county is a fruit county, and but little more gain than what is required for home consumption is grown.

Corn is thriving and growing rapidly; this crop, though small, would be very materially benefited by rain; it needs rain more than anything else.

Early cherries have been marketed, and the later cherries are now coming in. Rain would seriously injure the cherry crop at the present time.

The first cherries were a very heavy crop, and those now coming in will yield unusually well—but then, cherries always yield heavily in Oregon.

Black and raspberries are ripe. There is possibly no more prolific article of food grown in Oregon than these berries. They always do well; no matter what the climatic conditions may be, the berry crop is always large.

Hops continue their vigorous growth. Lice are found in all yards. The major portion of the growers are spraying to check the ravages of lice, though some few are not spraying, claiming that the low price will not warrant the labor and expense. The lice do not appear to be as plentiful as is usual at this season of the year.

The fruit outlook continues to be encouraging. The apple, pear, plum and prune trees are loaded with fruit. The peach trees are filled, as well. There are fewer insects this year than formerly, and where they do appear greater efforts are made to eradicate them than ever before.

The fruit crop is expected to be damaged from climatic conditions, hence it can quite safely be assumed that a successful fruit season is assured. Potatoes and vegetation of all kinds promise very large returns.
