The hunters' paradise is up in the hills toward the Nehalem, at Mr. Brice Wilson's. The county court was up there one day last week, when, after dinner, Mr. Wilson said: "Come out and see my ducks." He led the way through a back door into a shed, where he had his ducks. There were mallards, canvas backs, sprig tail, widgeons and every other variety that flies through the air or swims on the water—a hundred dozen of them. It is putting it mildly to say that the surprise was with the visitors. The great flock of over a thousand are decoys made for the market and bought by hunters. Mr. Wilson is skilled shaping these barbed ducks and painting them. The mechanical skill of that mountaineer is not confined to water fowl, but he has a tanning plant and makes an excellent quality of leather from sheep skins. A part of this week he further manufactures into shoes, used extensively throughout the neighborhood for forcing lagging.

A sad case of death by drowning occurred Sunday evening last in the Tualatin, near the Geiger bridge, south of Cornelius. About 6 o'clock Mr. John Ravecraft, his brother and one of Mr. Ravecraft's sons, went into the river bathing. John could not swim, but was wading and pushing a small boat before him. This was safe enough till he stepped off into a hole sixteen feet deep. It is thought that he was surprised by the depth and let go of the boat. He sank to the bottom where he grasped a root. One of his companions got hold of him once, but could not raise to the top, so he had to let loose of him. It was two hours before the body was recovered. The deceased was 22 years of age and robust. He was unmarried.

It is sometimes known as the Mead road and runs almost due north from Greenville. The route is six miles shorter than the one now used. Mr. Mead is now grading on the contract, for which the county appropriated the sum of fifty dollars some time ago. The local subscriptions amount to much more than that sum.

EASTERN OREGON.

Weather—No rain has fallen since the 4th and 5th of July. Then the rain was very light south and east of the Blue mountains and sufficiently heavy in the Columbia and Willamette sections to be of benefit. A warm wave passed over this section on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, when the temperature reached 90 to 95 degrees. Accompanying the warm weather there was a dry east to northeast wind. The full average sunshine occurred.

Crops—Notwithstanding the dry weather recently, crops in Wasco and Sherman counties are making good progress. Showers, which occurred during the first week of July, furnished the necessary moisture to bring them to maturity. This is especially so of grain, which is now turning color and ripening very rapidly. No fears are anticipated as to the yield of the grain crop in these counties. Within the past ten days there has come into this section millions of grasshoppers, but they came too late, as crops are too far advanced to be injured. New potatoes are full grown and yielding well. Recent warm weather has benefited the corn and bean crops. In the counties of Morrow, Gilliam and Umatilla the rain which occurred during the early days of the month produced only temporary benefit. Dry winds of late have caused the grain to shrink. Fruit also has been injured on account of the drought and is falling. Potatoes will make a fair crop in some sections. Harvest will be hastened by the dry weather. On several days the dense smoke in this section served to protect the crops from the scorching rays of the sun. Though conditions have been unfavorable, there will be exceptions, when there will be good yields and good quality of grain. South and east of the Blue mountains crops are suffering for want of rain, but rain even at this date would be beneficial. Haying is going on with vigor. Some good yields of hay are reported, but the alfalfa crop is fairly good. Yields of grain will be very light. Range grass is becoming scarce, which will necessitate feeding or selling the stock. Rain is improbable for the season, consequently the present condition of crops will not improve.
